"THE STORY OF ENGLISH" by Robert McCrum, William Cran, Robert MacNeil, is a combination storybook and detective story-with poetry, history, and humor all included.

It traces the roots of the English Language back beyond the Norman conquest of England. I found it interesting that the English Language as we know it did not originate in England, but was brought there by Saxons (a branch of Germans) when they over-ran the Celts in the fifth century.

The book covers the growth of English from those early beginnings to its spread into a global language; one that has, in the last 100 years, become a dominate world language.

It is an informative, yet readable book.

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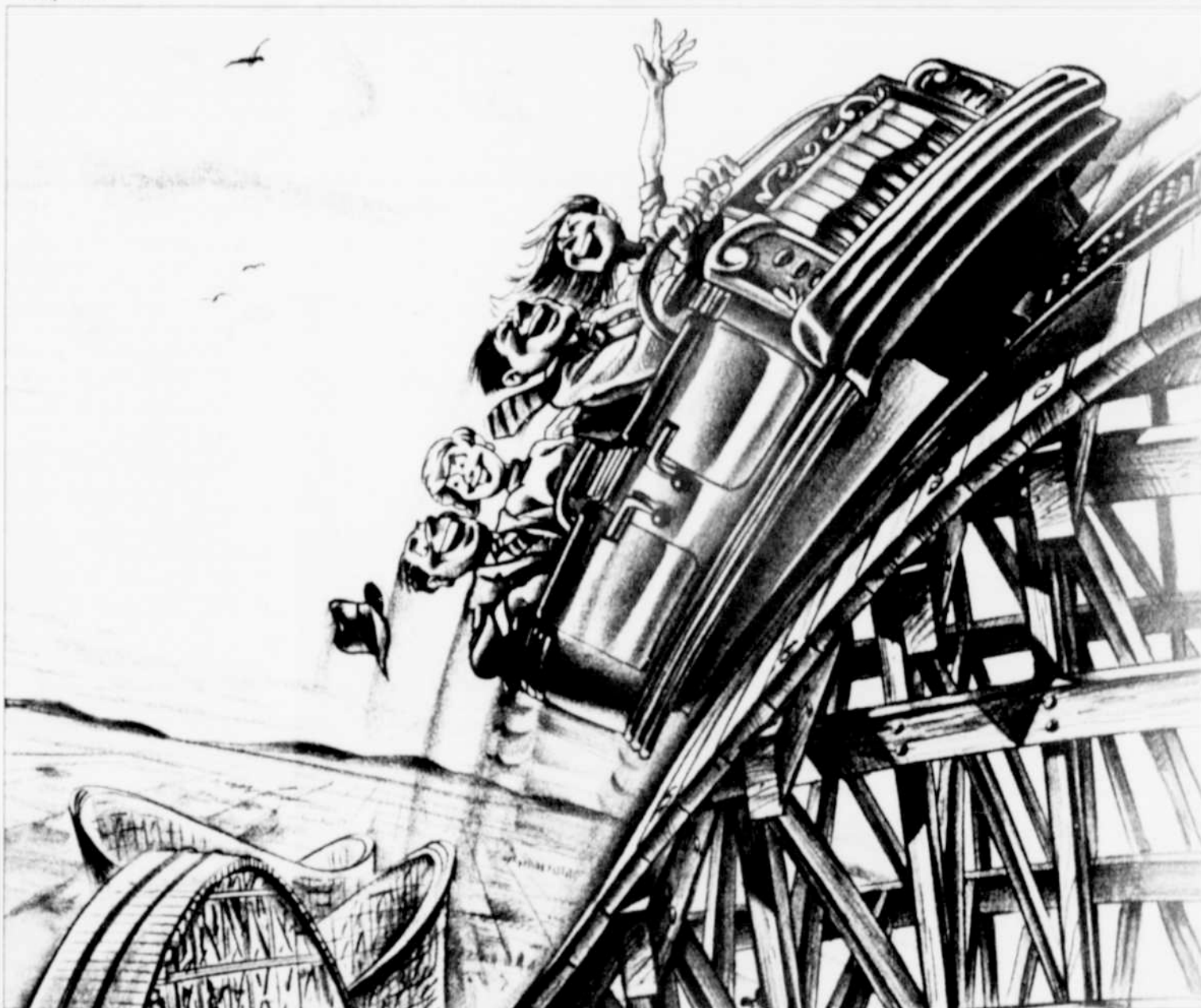


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
