Still time to enter big parade

There's still time to enter the St. Patrick's parade. Entry blanks are available at Farley Motor Co. and Turner, VanMarter, and Bryant Insurance Co. in Heppner.

Parade time is 1 p.m. Saturday, March 14. No parking will be allowed on Main St. this year so all should have a good view.

Parade Chairman, Bob Kahl, says that so far three Shrine Clubs, the Weston-McEwen bagpipe band, antique cars, horse-drawn entries, and several local organizations have returned entry forms. Those who are unable to pre-register for the parade may still join the march up Main St. if they are at Green Feed by noon Saturday when the parade is organizing. We won't turn anyone away, Kahl says, but we prefer pre-registration so we can organize better.

Sheep dog trials start 9:30 a.m. Saturday

St. Patrick's Weekend Sheep Dog Trials will get underway at 9:30 a.m. Saturday with a break for the 1 p.m. Irish parade, and continue Sunday morning at the Morrow County fairgrounds.

Dog Trialing is a growing sport in Oregon, say trial organizers. Twenty-one dogs had been entered in local competition as of Monday. Familiar faces, Scotty Stewart from British Columbia, Cliff Steelman from Walla Walla, Washington, Neal Fadler of Bremerton, Washington, and Virgil Brown of Scio will return this year. New faces this year will include Henry Trusler of Roy, Washington, with his dog Craig, Jean Johns from Cheney, Washington, Elizabeth Hubbard and her dog Buddy from Bonanza, and Bernie Miller and "Belle" from Baker. Additional registrations are expected.

All dogs will run once Saturday and the top five dogs in each class—novice, pro-novice, and open will run again on Sunday. Because so many dogs are entered this year, lack of time will prevent a second running of all dogs, organizers said. Frank Brunetto of Oregon City will judge the event again this year.

Dog trialing and spectators need not go hungry either day because senior citizens will operate a concession booth at the fairgrounds on Saturday and Mario Zubirri will prepare a Basque barbecued lamb dinner available at a cost of \$6 for adults and \$4.50 for children 12 and under from 12 noon to 2 p.m. Sunday.

ICABO slates town meeting

Ione Community and Agri-Business Organization is sponsoring a town hall meeting Wednesday, March 18, at the Ione High School cafeteria.

March 31 election issues will be discussed. Morrow County Judge Louis Carlson will explain the county operating levy and the health care operating levy which will appear on the ballot. Ken Turner will explain Willow Creek's Park District's \$29,300 operating levy. All six candidates for Port of Morrow board of commissioner positions, and school board candidates Randy Hughes and Marcia Kemp have been invited to participate in the meeting.

Although the school district will not have a levy on the March ballot, Superintendent Doyle McCaslin will be at the meeting to explain the levy the district is preparing for a May vote.

Each candidate and measure representative will be given a limited time to speak, said a meeting organizer, with time allowed at the end of the meeting for questions from the audience.

Everyone is invited to attend. Refreshments will be provided by the Ione Cardinal Club.

Four from Morrow County to be inducted into state cavalry

Four representatives of Morrow County will be inducted into the State of Oregon cavalry at the state's legislative meeting Saturday morning at the Heppner Elks Club.

Now in its infant stages, the cavalry when fully assembled, will be a full-dress ceremonial unit that will escort the state's executive officers in parades. "Colonel" Stan Wellman of Baker is co-ordinating the effort and will be in Heppner Saturday to officiate at the swearing in of four Morrow County inductees.

"Lieutenant John Moyer and cavalrymen Dick Sargent, Scott McDaniel, and Greg Maben are among the first to join the unit. Two more places for Morrow County are open, anyone interested in volunteering for one of them should contact Moyer for additional information. "We hope to put together a very polished group with authentic saddles and uniforms," "Lt." Moyer said.

The state's second annual legislative session at Heppner will begin at 10 a.m. in the Boy Scout room upstairs at the Elks Club. The public is invited to attend.
