

Sheriff's Report

The Morrow County Sheriff's Office at the Morrow County Courthouse in Heppner reports handling or dispatching the following business during the past week.

March 9-a Morrow County deputy arrested Keith R. Papineau, 29, Lexington, on a Umatilla County Warrant for Failure to Comply-Diversion. He was transported to Hermiston Safety Center where he will be picked up by the Umatilla County Sheriff's Office and taken to Pendleton.

March 9-a deputy attempted to locate a speeding vehicle in the Wagon Wheel Addition, Irrigon, that was reported to be throwing rocks.

March 10-a deputy investigated a report of a speeding vehicle on N.E. Boardman Ave. that also did damage to a yard. Two male juveniles were involved and will be referred to the Juvenile Dept.
