Ione library has new books about war

Two new books available at Ione Public Library give two different perspectives of war. The first is a historical non-fiction viewpoint, the latter is a fictional account.

"War", by Gwynne Dyer, (Crown Publishers, 1985). Dyer, who served in the Canadian, American, and British Navies and taught at Sandhurst in England, spent three years in the creation, writing, and presentation of the seven-part television series "War," seen in the United States on the Public Broadcasting System.

This book examines in detail the most complex and dangerous activity of human groups-war; the history of armed conflict, back to the very origins of warfare and examines its essentials-organized mass violence applied against an enemy so that he will do what you want him to do.

In conclusion, it would seem that war is basically the same now as when it originated soon after the dawn of mankind; modern technology has changed only the results of war.

Let this book take you on a fascinating journey of military history. (Reviewed by Tony Heideman.)

Red Storm Rising," by Tom Clanc-

cy, (G.P. Putnam & Sons, New York, 1986). Red Storm is the Soviet code name for a four month master plan of elaborate diplomatic trickery and a crash military buildup to keep the West off-balance. When Moslem terrorists blow up a key Soviet oil complex, making an already critical oil shortage disastrous, the Soviets decide that to survive, they must get control of the oil in the Persian Gulf, but they have to find a way to keep NATO from retaliating. And they find it, Red Storm.

In four months, they secretly build up their armed forces, at the same time spreading into Europe and the North Atlantic and the West finds itself in an all-out shooting war.

This is a remarkable story of modern warfare. Clancy weaves men, planes, ships, missiles and submarines: scenes of large scale battle and individual acts of heroism, moments of tragedy, joy and endurance into a pattern that dances and whirls before our eyes. It has a cast of Russians and Americans alike, very authentic and very real. (Reviewed by Martha Peterson).

Gardeners learn about shade

With the need for shade trees to protect plants from our hot summer sun the topic "Shade Loving Plants" was a good subject for discussion that was held by Delta Huber at the April 8 Ione Garden Club meeting held at the home of Jeanne Beeson.

Huber reported that there are two kinds of shade-dense and filtered. Also the slant of the sun's rays affects the intensity of its heat. All plants need light but not so much sun. Many plants need what is known as "full sun." There are many plants that do well in shade. These include most ground covers such as ajuga, sedum, ivy (English Ballica) and myrtle (vinca minor or periwinkle). Early spring bulbs do well under deciduous trees. The only herbs that do well in shade are bergamot or beebalm, sweet woodruff and angelica. Other plants are daylilies, hybrid lilies, hosta or plantain,

Christmas rose, campanula, climbing hydrangea and kerria. Annuals in the class are impatiens, fibrous begonias, bromollia, nicotiana, violets and violas and forget-me-nots.

Plans for the annual plant sale were discussed. Delta Huber, chairman, said that it would be held on April 29 at the Ione Legion Hall from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Some water shortages can be expected this season, the Soil Conservation Service's Heppner office reports. Spring and Summer streamflow is forecast below average during the April-July period.

These forecasts are 125 to 19% lower than they were last month. This is because the snowpack melted early. The above average rain and

The April 1 snowpack at the Arbuckle Mountain snow course was 22" deep with 8.9" of water. This is 89% of average. The Madison Butte SNOTEL site reported 3.1" of water equivalent.

Forecasts of streamflow, assuming normal weather conditions occur for the rest of the season, are as follows:

warm temperatures during March caused the snowpack to go from 125% of average on March 1 to 68% of average on April 1.
