

Mustangs split with TigerScots

Heppner's baseball team split a twinbill against the Weston-McEwen TigerScots on Saturday, April 18, dropping the first game 14-7 before coming back to take the nightcap 6-4.

In the first game Heppner's David Pedro went 2-3 with two doubles but it wasn't enough to overcome the TigerScots.

In the second game, doubles by Craig Angell, John Kenny and Bob Riehl and last-minute relief help from Troy Hyatt gave the Mustangs the win.

Heppner's Russell Britt issued 10 free passes to Weston-McEwen bat-

ters to earn the loss.

Todd Hanson went the distance in the first game for the TigerScots tossing a 10-hitter and helping himself at the plate with a home run.

Heppner trailed only 4-1 after 2½ innings of the first game but Weston-McEwen scored five runs in the bottom of the fourth to put the game out of reach.

The TigerScots built a 2-0 lead after the first inning in the nightcap but the Mustangs came alive with three runs in the fourth inning.

Kenny reached on an error and Pedro walked.

Britt then singled and Mark Fishburn sacrificed. Scott Davis then singled and Heppner had a 3-2

advantage.

Weston-McEwen added a run in its half of the fourth to tie the game at 3-3.

Kenny then started things off for the Mustangs in the fifth with a double and Pedro followed with run-scoring single.

Riehl then followed with a double and Britt sacrificed to score both Pedro and Riehl and give Heppner a 6-3 cushion.

The TigerScots scored in the sixth to pull within 6-4 before the dramatic seventh.

John Shanks and Whip Hagen walked to put runners on first and second with two outs before Hyatt came on in relief of Angell.

Hanson greeted Hyatt with a single to lead the bases before Hyatt struck out Shane Mallory to end the game and earn the save.

Angell earned the victory with four strikeouts and allowed five hits.

Angell and Kenny both went 2-4 for Heppner while Dick Devin was 2-3.

With the two losses Heppner fell to 5-4 in CBC play but still remains in the hunt for number two playoff spot in the CBC's Eastern Division.

David Pedro went 4-4 at the plate in the opener of the twinbill for the Mustangs and Scott Davis pounded a home run but it wasn't enough to beat the Rockets.

Even the rain didn't dampen the spirits of the Cardinal tracksters as they traveled to Heppner on Tuesday, April 28 for a five-way meet. Times were slowed by a muddy track, but overall everyone competed well.

The girls scored 49 points for second behind Pilot Rocks 72, and the boys finished second to Heppner's 96½ points with 75½ of their own.

In girls competition first places were recorded by Mary Cupps in the high jump at 4' 6", Deena Hams in the javelin with a toss of 121' 1" and in the discus with a throw of 99' 6".

Two firsts were also chalked up by Katie Doherty in the 1500 with a time of 6:13 and in the 800 with a time of 3:01.4. Second places went to Jo Cupps in the high jump at 4' 3" and the javelin at 79' and Deena Hams in the shot put at 31' 2".

Finishing in fourth place was Mary Cupps in the long jump at 12' 8½" and Jo Cupps in the shot put, 27' 11", and the discus 76' 9". Katie Doherty recorded a lone fifth in the long jump.
