## Boys take 5th at state

Heppner's boys and girls track teams completed their seasons last Friday and Saturday at the 41st annual Class "A" OSAA-U.S. Bank state track meet.

The boys team scored 24 points to tie Oakridge for fifth place. The Heppner girls did not score.

Leading the way for the boys was Bryan Padberg who successfully defended his state title in the 3,000-meter run with a winning time of 9:08.8. Padberg was also the defending 1,500-meter champ but was boxed in by a pack of runners during the race and was unable to break free, eventually finishing in a non-scoring seventh place.

The boys fifth place finish came after a sixth place finish a year ago and was aided by 10 first-day points from Wayne Wilgers and Jason Palmer which left Heppner in a tie for second.

Wilgers placed second in the high jump with a leap of 6-6 and was leading the competition until Mt. Vernon's Tony Williams cleared 6-7 on his second attempt. Wilgers missed at 6-7 on three tries.

Palmer uncorked a seasonal best of 138-10 in the preliminaries of the discus and was third going into the finals before winding up fifth.

Heppner's other points came from Gene Lancaster who put the shot 47-0 1/2 to place fourth.

Also competing at the state meet for the Heppner boys were Ashley Conklin in the triple jump and Jason Dougherty in both the 110 meter high hurdles and 300-meter intermediate hurdles. Conklin jumped 41-5 3/4 for his second best jump ever and finished a non-scoring ninth and falling short of the finals. Dougherty, competing against outstanding competition, was unable to make the finals despite posting personal bests in the high hurdles (1:15.9) and intermediates (4:1.4).

"I was pleased with the way we performed because it's an accomplishment just to place at state," head coach Dale Conklin said, "and 24 points is a lot to score at state." Heppner's three girls, Michelle Beck, Dorothy Hays and Kim Stookey all performed well. Stookey set personal bests in both the 1,500 and 3,000 running 5:31.5 and 12:21.9 respectively. Hays ran the second fastest time ever in the high

hurdles (1:18.2), and Beck clocked her second fastest 3,000 ever (12:28.3).

The boys, who were District 7-A champs this season will lose. Conklin, Palmer, and Wilgers but will have Dougherty, Lancaster and Padberg back next season.

The girls, who were fifth at district, lose only Hays.

Central Linn and Salem Academy were both Class "AA" schools a year ago. Central Linn won the boys title with 62 points while Salem Academy had 55 points to take the girls crown.

The Riverside boys also had a good team showing, trying for sixth place with 20 points while Helix was the top District 7-A girls team with 17 points.

Alvin Johannes, 69, Heppner, died Sunday, May 24, at St. Anthony Hospital in Pendleton.

A graveside memorial service will be at the grave of the unknown soldier in the Masonic Cemetery, Heppner, with the American Legion posts of Heppner, Ione, and Lexington officiating. The service will begin at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, May 30.

Johannes was born March 31, 1918, the son of Fred and Rose Johannes at Swanville, Minnesota.

He married Alberta Detrie December 24, 1969 in St. Johns, Arizona.

He was a logger most of his life and retired from Kinzua Corp. in 1980. He was a veteran of World War II serving in the U.S. Army Air Force. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

He is survived by his wife Alberta at the home in Heppner; his mother Rose of Little Falls, Minnesota; two step-daughters, Joy Ann Wells, Lake Isabella, California and Donna May Cole, Tujunga, California; two sisters Irene Johannes and Genevieve Johannes, both in Minnesota; one step-brother Leonard Strom, Seattle, Washington; and four brothers Clarence, Helmut, and Marvin, all in Minnesota, and Winifred, in Montana. He was preceded in death by his father and one brother, Richard.
