### Casting and Stalking

A twelve-day mule deer season for all of eastern Oregon, and a split deer season for the Cascade hunt area were among the 1987 Fall hunting regulations adopted May 16 by the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission.

Regulation sheets and instructions for controlled hunt applications are now available at license dealer outlets.

The October 3-14 deer season on the east side follows several years where some untes were only open for five days or closed entirely because of extremely low deer populations. A combination of good fall green-up and a mild winter and spring has yielded the best fawn survival in several years. Overall mule deer, numbers are the best since the 1970's wildlife biologists report.

Elk seasons statewide will be virtually the same as 1986 with two-period seasons for the coast and Rocky Mountain Elk areas, and an October 17-23 season for Cascade Units. Rocky Mountain Elk seasons will be first period, October 28-November 1; and second period, November 7-15.

Deer and elk bow hunting seasons will run from August 22 through September 20. The chesnimus unit in Northeast Oregon will be open to bow hunters for the first time in three years.

Trout fishing at Willow Creek lake is still pretty slow, but the Smallmouth Bass in the lake are now on the prowl and they're taking anything from a rooster tail, to a nightcrawler on the bottom or with a bobber.

If you don't feel like going one-on-one with a Smallmouth Bass, the local creeks are still in fine shape for fishing. Please remember to ask permission from private landowners before going on their property.

This week, the tip of the Sportsman's cap goes to Mr. Glavey on Upper Rhea Creek for providing great hunting and fishing for local sportsmen for many years.

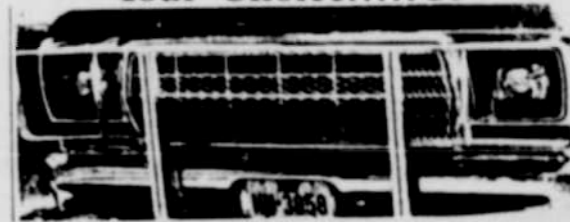
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
