Sheriff's Report

The Morrow County Sheriff's office reports handling or dispatching the following business during the past week:

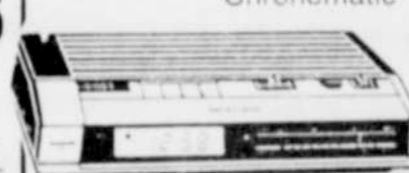

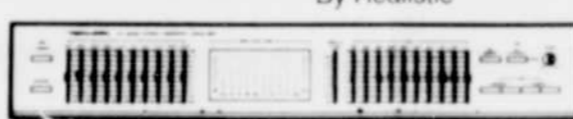
