He was born December 14, 1903 to Charlie and Mary Kegley at Herman, Minnesota. He grew up and attended school in Campbell, Minnesota. His family moved from Minnesota to Portland in 1917. He later moved to Ione with his mother in 1919. He moved back to Portland during the 1920s.

On August 17, 1929, he married Inez Crum. He owned and operated a restaurant on 82nd and Division in Portland for several years before moving to Hood River in 1936. At that time he bought a Maytag franchise. He enjoyed racing motorcycles after retiring from the appliance business. He was an avid hunter and enjoyed fly fishing. In 1975, he married Lola Sisson.

He is survived by a daughter, Lois Smith of Salem; sons Larry M. of Seabrook, Texas, and Joe of Rio Rancho, New Mexico; and six grandchildren.

William Elmer "Bill" Davis died of cancer June 2 at his home south of Bend.

He was born in Lyman, Miss., on Dec. 14, 1916, to James Fullerton and Ruth (Hall) Davis.

He married Ellen "Pat" Stingle in Beaverton on Aug. 28, 1938. Two children were born to them, Nancy Ellen and William Edward. William Edward was killed in 1974.

Davis served in the Marine Corps in the South Pacific during World War II. He was a fourth-generation saw filer in his family and worked in Oregon mills. During the 1960s, he owned a saw shop in Philomath. When he lived in Heppner, he led a large Boy Scout troop, which left him many happy memories. He also organized the Morrow Co. for Civil Defense during those years.

He is survived by his wife, Pat; a daughter Dr. Nan Kribs of Flagstaff, Ariz.; a daughter-in-law, Carolyn Davis of Corvallis; and three grandchildren, Laura Jane Davis of Portland, Ben Davis of Corvallis and Martin Kribs of Flagstaff.

Other surviving relatives are a brother and sister-in-law, James and Betty Lynn Davis of Florence; a sister and brother-in-law, Betty and Don Maynard of Monument; another sister-in-law, Lucille Davis of Wilmington, N.C.; and several nieces and nephews.

The Morrow County Sheriff's Office at the Morrow County Courthouse in Heppner reports handling or dispatching the following business during the past week:

During the exercise conducted in and around the Republic of Korea, Borst participated in exercises to increase the defensive capabilities of the Republic of Korea and the U.S. Seventh Fleet.
