

Radio controlled planes make good hobby

It's a good, grown-up hobby, Dick Snider of Lone says is why he flies radio controlled airplanes.

He and several others got together last month west of Lone for a Fun Fly. Beginners and experienced radio-controlled pilots alike showed up for the afternoon event. Skies were clear and the wind was still. Planes varied from a streamlined, modern glider that cruised at speeds of 90/100 miles per hour to a bulkier, seasoned aircraft with an air speed of two miles per hour.

Novice Loren Heideman who made his "first flight without a crash" that day, said he'd always wanted to fly radio controlled planes and had become interested by watching others fly.

Ron Palmateer and Dick Snider have both been flying the radio controlled planes for about five years. "Flying them is a challenge," Palmateer said. "It's a great sport for people who like airplanes."

Not yet an organized club, the Lone fliers say it's always fun to meet new people and to get together with radio controlled plane enthusiasts from other areas. Several planes and operators from Hermiston were at the Fun Fly.

Tom Wilson, a crop duster from Hermiston, lent his expertise to help train a couple of beginners. The procedure is to connect two radio-control boxes so the trainee can fly the plane, but if he gets into trouble, the more experienced pilot can override his controls to prevent a disaster.

Planes start in price at \$35 for a kit the owner can put together

himself and go upward in price, Palmateer said. They are available at hobby stores as close as Hermiston and Pendleton or through wholesale catalogs. If you want to get started in the hobby, though, you would be better off talking to someone who is experienced in the sport before making your first purchase, he said. To start, you don't want too fast a plane because approaching and departing planes require opposite commands, and you need time to react.

Actual experience flying in an airplane may help some, Wilson said, "because you know what a plane can do, but when it comes to using the controls, flying experience can be a hindrance."

"It's easy to get discouraged when you're learning," Palmateer admitted. Sooner or later everybody crashes; most invest in a second (or third) plane so they have backup when a crash requiring extensive repairs occurs.

Others invest in additional planes

for the challenge or because they are able to do different things. Snider, who likes the speed and aerobatics

one of his planes performs, said that there is always a better plane and another challenge to look forward to.

Extension offers 4-H cookbook

Recipes for four Morrow 4-H'ers are included in the cookbook just published to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of OSU Extension and 4-H program.

Scott Johnston, Heppner; Judy Jepsen, Lone; Amy Hobbs and Swayne Evans, Irrigon; shared recipes they had prepared at Oregon State Fair last year.

Each recipe has been tested prior to publication and includes calories, protein, total fat, cholesterol, carbohydrates, sodium and potassium per serving for those with special dietary needs or restrictions.

"Every recipe has been used by a 4-H'er," according to Birdine Tullis, Morrow Extension Service. Name and county of each is listed with his recipe, she said. The cookbook should become a collector's item as well as a really good family cookbook.

Scott Johnston's contribution was his award-winning Strawberry Shortcake. Since this is Strawberry season, his easy-to-make recipe below is a timely recipe.

Strawberry Shortcake
 3 cups flour
 4 1/2 tsp. baking powder
 3 tbsps sugar
 1 1/2 tsp. salt
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 1/2 cup milk
 2 tbsps butter
 6 cups sliced strawberries
 Combine flour, baking powder, sugar and salt in bowl. Cut in shortening until crumbly. Stir in milk just until blended. Spread in two greased 8-inch cake pans. Dot with butter. Bake in preheated 450 degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes or until light brown. Cool. Remove from pans. Top shortcake with strawberries. (Yield: 8 servings) Approx. per serving: Cal 412, Protein 7.3 gr, T Fat 19.5 gr, chol 15.3 mg, Carbo 52.6 gr, Sod 644.5 mg Potas 297.2 mg.
