Unemployment rate drops

Morrow's unemployment rate fell 7.8% in May from April's 9.8% and last May's 10.2%. This reflects a strong increase in Agricultural employment as total wage and salary employment was the same for both May and April, increases in other economic sectors barely balancing out a slight decrease in food processing employment.

Governor's school support plan would mean more money for Morrow County

Morrow County School District would receive an additional \$39,015 in 1987-88 under the school support plan that Gov. Neil Goldschmidt has submitted to the legislature.

The governor proposes adding \$30 million in state aid to schools over the next two years. About \$10 million would be spent in 1987-88, the remaining \$20 million the following year.

In the 1988-89 school year, the State would pay about 30% of local

school costs, compared to 29% this year, under the governor's plan.

In his proposed budget, the governor had asked for \$486 million in aid to local schools in 1987-88, compared to \$481 million in the current year. To add another \$10 million this year and \$20 million in 1988-89, the legislature is being asked to waive the limitation on spending, in order to send the money to local school districts.

In the first year, the governor's plan would guarantee that no Oregon district will receive less state aid than it received in 1986-87. "Without this measure, 143 Oregon school districts will actually receive less in 1987 than they did in 1986," the governor said. "That's why it's so vital."
