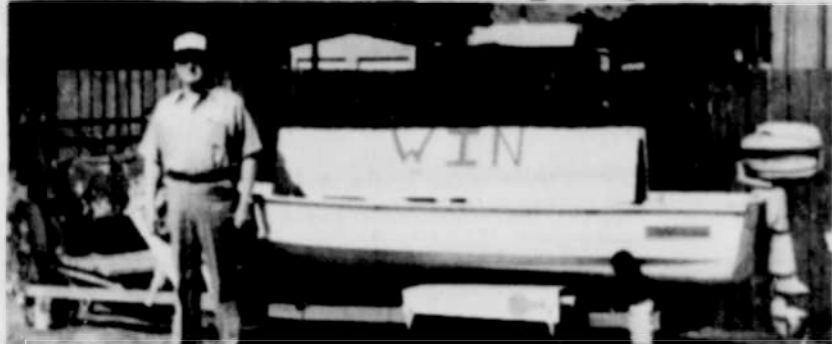


To benefit senior projects

Fishing festival slated

Schools of fishermen will stream to Boardman this weekend for the First Annual Boardman Fishing Festival.

The festival, sponsored by the North Morrow County Chamber of Commerce, will include many different fish-related activities.

Registration for the Walleye bass fishing tournament will begin Friday evening and conclude Saturday from 6 to 8:30 a.m. at the Boardman Riverfront Park. The tournament will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday and Sunday. Weigh-ins each day will start at 3 p.m. The awards ceremony is scheduled for after Sunday's weigh-ins. Cost of the tournament is \$100 per team (pair) and \$75 per team with a school age participant. Prizes will be awarded in various categories including: Largest Fish, Total Weight and a Youth category.

Kegler's SENTRY is also continuing its First Annual Walleye Fishing contest which runs through September 30. Five dollars per pound will be awarded to the largest fish weighed at the store. The second largest fish will receive \$2.50 per pound.

Three professional fishermen will conduct a seminar by discussing various fishing strategies beginning at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

Mike Smith, Seattle, one of the nation's top tournament bass fishermen, will speak on "Locating and Catching Techniques of the Small Mouth Bass in a River System."

Ed Iman, a professional fisherman from Gresham, will speak on "The Habits of the Columbia River Walleye."

"The Columbia has the fastest

growing Walleye in the U.S.," Iman said. "The three pounders that come out of here are only about 2-and-a-half-years-old." Iman expects the winning Walleye of the tournament to weigh more than 12 pounds.

The final speaker for the evening will be Gary Roach. Roach is from Brainerd, Minn. He has been deemed the top Walleye fisherman in the United States. Roach will speak on "Techniques for Catching Walleye."

In addition to the tournament and the seminars, many tackle companies will be here promoting their products.

According to Bruce Nicholes, festival chairman, manufacturers in the fishing industry have also donated rods, reels, smokers, outboard oil, and tackle to be raffled off Saturday night. Tickets will be on sale for \$1 each or 7 for \$5. Funds from the fishing tournament and the raffle will go to benefit the Oregon Warm Water Fisheries Project, said Nicholes. "We want to purchase some Walleye hatch (minnows) and release them on the Washington side of the (Columbia) river," he said.

Nicholes indicated that the Oregon State Game Commission prohibits the release of Walleye minnows on the Oregon side of the Columbia River. Nicholes also said that members of the Fisheries Project want to work with the Port of Morrow in order to help bass and crappie planting through the use of the Port's Messner Pond.

Members of a Washington bass club will also be in Boardman this weekend for a tournament of their own, Nicholes added. "The town is going to be packed with fishermen."

Fingering steelhead, over two million of them, will soon be happily swimming in outdoor cement ponds at the Irrigon Fish Hatchery, just in time for a dedication of the facilities.

Speakers, refreshments, honored guests, and Oregon Wildlife personnel encouraging visitors to tour the facilities, including the indoor incubator trays and starting tanks from which the Imnaha and Grande Ronde fingerlings have just emerged, will be the order of the day July 25 at 1 p.m.

Randy Fisher, Director of the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Service

from Portland, and other honored guests representing the Army Corps of Engineers and Oregon Fish and Wildlife, will be speaking at the open house, according to Mike Gribble, assistant manager of the Irrigon hatchery.

There will be six guides stationed at various points to answer questions concerning the automatic feeders, cement ponds, display pond, visitor's center, and future of the steelhead, according to Gribble.

Refreshments will be served after the ceremony, hosted by the Oregon Fish and Wildlife and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The public is invited.
