Former Heppner coach to attend reunion

Lyle Swenson of Cle Elum, Washington, coach of the 1942 Heppner High football team that played for the State B Championships, will join some 130 former students, spouses and teachers this weekend, according to Jim Barratt of Corvallis, reunion co-chairman and co-captain of that 1942 team.

Reunion of this team will be part of the 1940 through 1946 Heppner High School reunion at the Elks Lodge on Saturday night and Sunday morning.

"Coach Swenson is now 75 years of age, has retired some 12 years from a family-owned restaurant in Cle Elum, is in good shape and plays golf three times a week," Barratt reported.

The 1942 Mustangs with a 6-1-1 record claimed the Eastern Oregon B school title and was challenged by Dayton in the mythical state championship played at Linfield College, McMinnville. Heppner led at halftime 7-0 but lost the game 20 to 13. Only regular season loss was to Hermiston, an A school.

About half the team members have already registered for the reunion. Out of the 26 team members, two are deceased, Hubert Wilson and Ken Shideler.

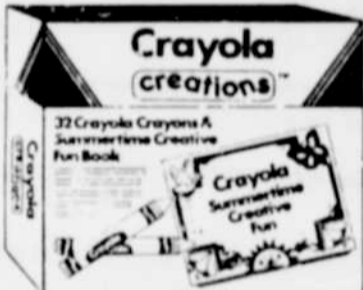

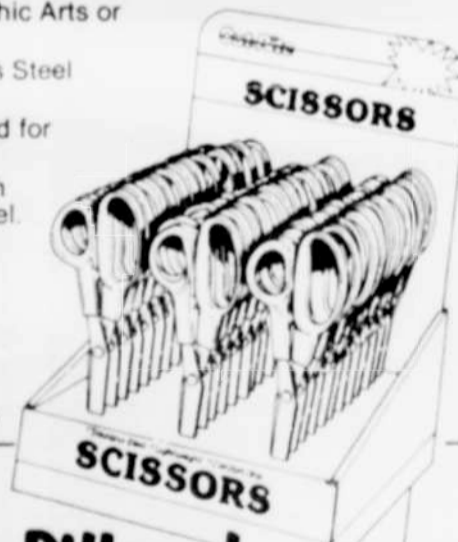

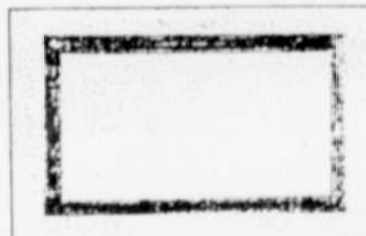
