

Traffic deaths down from last year

Fifty-nine people died in Oregon traffic accidents in July, according to the Motor Vehicles Division.

The 1987 figure is down from July 1986 when there were 64 traffic deaths. The year total so far is also down. There have been 318 Oregon traffic deaths during the first seven months of the year, compared with 342 in the same period in 1986.

The July 1987 figure includes two traffic deaths which occurred on Oregon roads during the Fourth of July holiday weekend. There were five double fatality accidents during the month. These occurred in Marion, Clackamas, Klamath, Umatilla and Multnomah counties.

The fatalities include 31 drivers, nine passengers, ten motorcyclists, four pedestrians and five bicycle riders.

Of the 40 motor vehicle drivers and passengers, 36 were not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Neither of two victims who were under 16 were using a seat belt or other restraint. Oregon law requires any motor vehicle occupant under 16 years of age be in a seat belt or other restraint.

Six of the ten motorcyclists were not wearing a helmet.

County Sheriff considers taking over Irrigon law enforcement

The Morrow County Sheriff would take over law enforcement in Irrigon if the city accepts a proposal from the agency for its services inside the city limits.

The Irrigon City Council heard the proposal at its July 14 meeting, but tabled any action until August. Mayor Don Eppembach said the council needed more time to review the proposal. If accepted, the Irrigon Police Department would be closed.

Under the intergovernmental agreement the sheriff's department would assign two deputies to the city full time. There would be no decrease in police services, Eppembach said.

Eppembach said the city would provide police radios and two patrol cars for the deputies in addition to

an annual fee of about \$67,000. This fiscal year the city has budgeted \$66,840 for police services. Cost of living raises scheduled into the sheriff department's union contract would add about \$2,000 to the fee next year.

Eppembach said the city is seriously looking into the proposal instead of hiring a new police chief to replace chief Mike Cahill. Cahill will leave the Irrigon Police Department August 7 to join the Junction City Police Department as chief.

Howlett will replace Bob Kelly

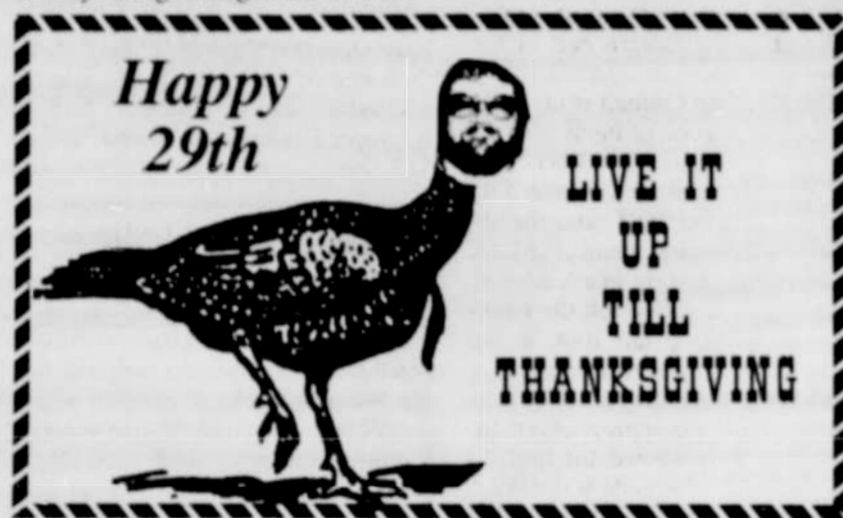
BMCC dean
