Historic preservation grants available

A total of \$10,000 grants will be awarded for preservation of historic properties through the State Historic Preservation Office.

Deadline for application is September 25 and all projects must be completed by May 30, according to Tibby O'Brien, grants manager.

Funds will be awarded on a reimbursement basis and must be matched dollar-for-dollar or more.

Top priority will be given to restoration projects and those sponsored by private and public nonprofit entities, O'Brien said. Projects will

also be evaluated according to the ratio of match-the greater the ratio of matching dollars, the higher the ranking, O'Brien added.

Projects to be funded will be selected by a committee. For application information, contact O'Brien at the State Historic Preservation Office, 525 Trade St. S.E., Salem, 97310 or phone 378-5001.

Source of the funds is an application fee paid when historic property owners apply for a 15-year tax freeze authorized by the Legislature, O'Brien said.
