### Butterflies distance champs

How far can a butterfly fly? According to Ranger Rick magazine, the world's champion butterfly long-distance flier is a kind of painted lady. Each spring hundreds of thousands of painted ladies leave their winter homes in North Africa and Asia Minor. Most stop off in southern England and spend the summer there. But a few painted ladies fly on to northern Iceland near the Arctic Circle. That's nearly 4,000 miles, or almost one-sixth of the way around the world.

## August brings spider mite weather

Spider mites can be a problem in some home landscapes throughout the summer, but this tiny pest's favorite time of the year is August.

Spider mites feed on the leaves or needles of landscape plants and, in the process, destroy plant leaf cells which weakens the plant and causes discoloration of foliage.

Spider mites are about the size of a small pinhead and therefore are hard to see. They also multiply rapidly. In hot weather spider mite eggs can mature into adult spider mites in 10 days. Adult spider mites vary in color from yellowish green to brown to red.

If you suspect spider mites are feeding on your landscape plants, look for the tiny, white webbing the mites spin.

In the home garden, spider mites may infest green beans, sweet corn, peas, cucumbers and melons.

In the home landscape, spider mites attack conifers and soft-leaved deciduous plants. Also, roses, lilacs, juniper and arbutus may be spider mite hosts. Broad leaved evergreens such as rhododendrons and azaleas are less subject to attacks.

For control of spider mites, simply washing off infested plant foliage with a pressurized stream of water is effective. However, the spider

spider. Many insecticides have no effect on them.

Insecticides like Malathion and Diazinon may be labeled for mites but they are not as effective as true miticides, and may do more harm than good.

The chemicals Vendex, Plictran, Kethane, Pentac, and Metasystox-R are miticides legal to use in Oregon. Some, like Vendex, are a restricted use pesticide, and can be applied only by a licensed pest control operator.

Spider mites have built up a resistance to some miticides. It is important to identify the kind of mite you have before determining the kind and amount of miticide to apply.

Kelthane is probably the miticide most available for home horticultural use. If you can't find it, ask your local store to order it.

## Ag station has new director

The Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station has a new director. Thayne R. Dutton has been named to the top agricultural research post at Oregon State University.

Dutton will come to OSU October 1 from Michigan State University where he has served as chairperson of the department of food science and human nutrition. His appointment was announced by Graham Spanier, OSU academic affairs vice president and provost, and Roy Arnold, dean designate for the College of Agricultural Sciences.

As director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, Dutton will head a research enterprise with an annual budget of about \$20 million from federal, state and other sources. Besides the central station at Corvallis, it includes nine branch stations and research centers.

"Agricultural research is entering an era in which the emphasis will be on quality, marketing, pest control and advances in biotechnology," Spanier said.
