## Power pioneer honored

Billy E. Gentry of Heppner has received a "Power Pioneer Award" from Bonneville Power Administration for his achievements in the development of electrical power in the Northwest.

Gentry began his career with Columbia Basin Electric during its construction phase in 1948 and participated in the hookup of its first customer. He is still employed there after 39 years.

BPA Administrator James J. Jura presented pioneers of the power movement in the Northwest with appreciation awards commemorating

their extraordinary contributions and the "many years of commitment to furthering the electrification of the region." The individuals were nominated by their utilities and direct service customers of BPA.

The Power Pioneer Awards were presented in a recent ceremony at "Roll On, Columbia," a celebration of the 50th anniversaries of Bonneville Power Administration and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Bonneville Lock & Dam. In 1937, President Franklin D. Roosevelt dedicated the newly completed Bonneville Lock & Dam, the first dam in the Federal Columbia River Power System. Bonneville Power Administration was formed to distribute the electricity generated by the dam, with public utilities and direct service industries as preference customers.

Market steers sold for prices ranging from 70¢ to \$1.40 per pound. Jim Clark's FFA Grand Champion Steer brought \$1.40 per pound. Theresa Lindsay's 4-H Grand Champion Steer brought \$1.15/lb.

Market lambs sold for prices ranging from \$1.55 to \$5.50 per pound. Nancy Bailey's Grand Champion FFA lamb brought \$2.50. Ryan Evans' Grand Champion 4-H lamb brought \$5.50.

## School lunches available for reduced prices

Morrow County School District has announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program. Each school and the District Office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility:

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced priced meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income and the amount and source of the income received by each household member; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy designated principals will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the principal may wish to discuss the decision with the principal on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Doyle McCaslin, Supt., Box 368, Lexington, OR 97839 for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wishes to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the US Dept. of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap.
