Methodist Sunday School begins

The Heppner United Methodist Church will hold its Annual Church School "Kick-off" breakfast this Sunday, Sept. 13, beginning at 9 a.m. All ages, nursery through adult, are invited to attend this breakfast which is being prepared by the men of the congregation. Donations will be taken to defray the cost of the breakfast. During this time, students and their parents may

register for the fall classes of Sunday School. This will be the first day of the Church School classes which will take place immediately following the breakfast.

The regular worship service will follow this first Sunday of Church School classes at 11 a.m. During the coffee fellowship following the worship service, the Pictorial Directories which were compiled last spring will be handed out.

The Pendleton Round-Up and Happy Canyon Pageant will kick off the world famous shows September 16-19 with some warm-up activities including a dress-up parade and dance. Four performances of the PRCA Rodeo will be held each day at 1:15 featuring 500 cowboys competing for \$53,700 in prize money.

Also, four performances of the Happy Canyon Pageant and Dance will take place each evening at 7:45. Rodeo competition will include seven professional events; saddle bronc, bull riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bareback, steer wrestling and team roping. There will also be competition in a Wild Horse Race, wild Cow Milking and Baton and Pony Express Racing.

Others events during the four days will feature Indian Tribal Dancing, Indian Beauty Contests and Stage Coach Races.

The Happy Canyon Pageant is a colorful presentation of early Indian culture and the changes that came with emigrants and frontier town living.

Some special events include the Round-Up Week Kick-Off on Sept. 12. Townspeople put on a parade beginning at 7 p.m. followed by a dance with music by the Charlie Daniels Band.

Music for the Happy Canyon dances will be supplied by the McKenzie River Band.

During the Round-Up, there are daily events including barbecues, cowboy breakfasts, Indian tribal dancing, family days, senior citizens days and cowboy shows on the main street of town.

Over 500 volunteers from the Pendleton area help put on the show which was started by a group of ranchers and farmers in 1910.

NOTICE OF REALTY ACTION AVAILABILITY OF PERMITS (TEMPORARY AUTHORIZATIONS) FOR AGRICULTURAL USE IN TRESPASS ON PUBLIC LAND IN BAKER, GRANT, HARNEY, MALHEUR, MORROW, UMATILLA, UNION AND WALLOWA COUNTY, OREGON; ASOTIN AND GARFIELD COUNTY, WASHINGTON.

The Bureau of Land Management is accepting temporary permit applications for unauthorized agricultural use of public land in the Vale District. Permits will be issued noncompetitively under Section 302 of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (43 U.S.C. 1732) for the same or similar use of the public land in trespass. The issuance of the permit will provide an opportunity for the users of the public land and the Bureau to resolve the unauthorized use in a manner that is fair and equitable. Significant changes in use and/or long-term leases will be considered on a case-by-case basis under Section 202 of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act.

The purpose of the temporary authorization program is to abate existing and prevent future unauthorized uses of public land on the Vale District in Oregon and Washington in a non-punitive and cost effective manner. In order to participate in BLM's agricultural trespass resolution efforts, a trespasser who applies for a temporary use permit must show that his/her use occurred prior to January 1, 1987 and that he/she acknowledges Federal ownership of the land. Permit applications must be submitted prior to December 31, 1987. Unauthorized uses discovered subsequent to that date may be subject to immediate eviction and reclamation requirements, in addition to damages and full cost recovery. Maps showing the public lands open to permit and an inventory of known agricultural trespasses is available at the Vale District Office and the Baker Resource Area Office.

Permit applications and additional information are available from the Vale District Office and the Baker Resource Area Office. There is no application fee. However, agricultural use of public land is subject to fair market rental, and the reimbursement of costs, in accordance with 43 CFR 2920.6.

For a period of 45 days from the date of publication of this notice in the FEDERAL REGISTER, interested parties may submit comments to the District Manager, Bureau of Land Management, 100 Oregon Street, Vale, Oregon 97918, or the Baker Resource Area Manager, P.O. Box 987, Baker, Oregon 97814. Objections will be reviewed by the State Director who may sustain, vacate, or modify this realty action. In the absence of any objections, this realty action will become the final determination of the Department of the Interior. William C. Calkins District Manager
