Road Report

September 7-18

The Morrow County Public Works Road Department has completed the Valby Road, and Rattlesnake Canyon seal coating and has been concentrating forces on the Big Butter Creek Road project. Last week six miles of the worn out asphalt has been ripped and reprocessed and a three inch lift of gravel laid.

Also several portions of Baseline Road were patched, along with Jordan Grade and Sand Hollow. The small bridge structure that was replaced near Pine City has settled and been patched with asphalt mix and Miller Road received some maintenance work.

The Road Department has purchased 7,000 cubic yards of crushed rock at Arbuttle Corral for gravel road maintenance this fall. Several road crewmen were involved in transporting this rock to a local stockpile. Upper Little Butter Creek and the North Fork roads will receive most of this rock later this year.

On the North End the crew has been continuing their work on Wilson Road, but have turned their attention lately onto roadside brush and grass cutting for many Boardman and Irrigon area roads, primarily those used on school bus routes. Kunze, Wilson, Paul Smith, 3rd, 4th, and 8th Streets, are among some of the roads that got roadside maintenance last week.

This coming week the North End crew will continue the same emphasis on roadside maintenance, along with the Wilson Road project. On the South End the Big Butter Creek project will continue to be our first priority for the main crew, while any available personnel will be doing patching and roadside maintenance throughout the County.
