### Trauma advisory board to meet

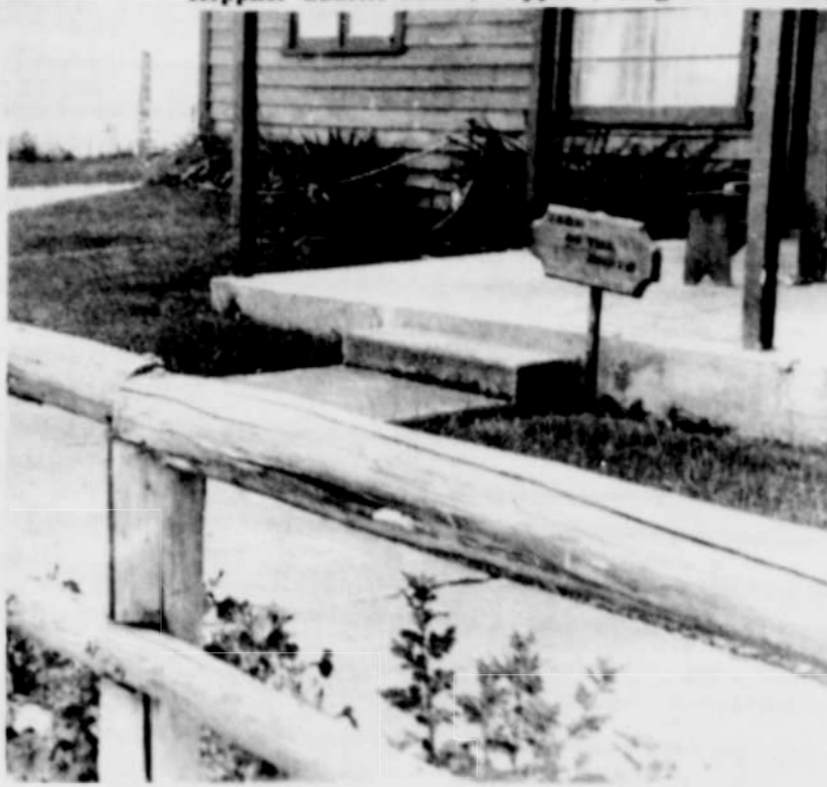
