There will be an American Red Cross blood drawing Monday, Sept. 28 at Heppner Elks Lodge from 3-7 p.m. The drawing is sponsored by Pioneer Memorial Hospital.

According to Drawing Coordinator Sandi Hanna "Every 10 seconds, someone needs blood. That means an adequate supply must be on hand at all times. You can help maintain a safe blood supply for yourself and others by donating this Monday."

"Giving blood is safe and easy," continued Sandi Hanna. "The entire process will take less than an hour of your time." The process includes

registration; a check of heart rate, hemoglobin content and blood pressure; the donation itself and refreshments.

American Red Cross Blood Services are supported by voluntary gifts of blood. All donors must be at least 18 years of age, in good overall health and weigh more than 110 pounds. People age 65 and older may donate without a physician's permission. With an American Red Cross Consent Form signed by a parent, 17 year olds are also eligible.
