Heppner doctor's son nominated for award

Scott McMurdo has been nominated for the Oregon State University E.B. Lemon Alumni Award. Scott McMurdo was the third son of Dr. and Mrs. A.D. McMurdo. Dr. McMurdo practiced medicine in Heppner for over 50 years and was honored as Oregon's first "Doctor of the Year" in 1956. McMurdo founded and directed Physicians Medical Laboratory, 1950-53, Grants Pass. He founded and directed Physicians Medical Laboratory and X-Ray, Corvallis, in 1953. It was destroyed by fire in 1965. He is founder and president of Investment Consultants International which has offices in Corvallis, Portland, Honolulu. He retired in 1985.

Fire caution
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circle. Build campfires away from overhanging branches, steep slopes, rotten stumps or logs, dry grasses and leaves. Pile firewood away from the fire. Fires should be small and surrounded by a rock campfire ring. You should also have an ax, shovel and bucket of water within easy reach, he said.

To put the fire out, let it die down, drown the fire with water, and using a stick, mix the coals with dirt until it is cold enough to touch with your bare hand. Feel each burned piece to make sure it is dead. Remember, it is illegal to leave any fire unattended.

When smoking is permitted, clear the area within a three-foot radius around you of all flammable material. Be sure that your match is out. Be sure to grind out your cigarette, cigar or pipe tobacco in the dirt where you are sitting. Fires can occur when tobacco is ground on a stump or log. While in your car, always use your ashtray. When walking, on horseback, or on a trailbike, stop, find or make a cleared area, and sit down while you smoke.
