Cards unable to catch Wallowa in 'barn burner'

 From the opening of the game it was apparent to everyone who attended that the score would be very high. After a very shaky first quarter, the Cardinals settled down and started to get the offense into the game.
 The Cardinals fought back in the second quarter when senior quarterback Kevin Ball scored two touchdowns and a two point conversion. Ball's first touchdown was a one-yard run and his second in the half was on an eight-yard run.
 The Cardinals outscored the Wallowa Cougars in the second quarter 14-13 bringing the halftime score to 31-14.
 The third quarter action favored the Cougars with the exception of freshman kickoff return specialist Jim Holtz who returned the pigskin 90 yds for a touchdown. Junior tailback Justin Padberg and sophomore fullback Shawn Hams both added key blocks in Holtz's return. The touchdown was the first one for the freshman who has just recently worked his way into the starting lineup.
 Cardinals lineman Gary Rea also entered the scoring column for one of the first times in his football career scoring the conversion point. Ball added his third touchdown of

the game early in the fourth quarter on a three-yard run.
 Junior backup quarterback Sean Warren also contributed a 21-yard touchdown scramble late in the fourth quarter.
 After an incredible interception by Hams the Cardinals took over with one minute left on the clock.
 Warren who was quarterbacking the Cards threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to Ball for his fourth touchdown of the night. Warren also caught the point after conversion from the scrambling Ball to score the last two points of the night.
 Mike Bennett, a starting back for Wallowa, had five touchdowns in the game and had seven carriers for 96 yards to lead the Cougars.
 Ball also added 106 yards along with his four touchdowns. Other leaders in the rushing department were Padberg who had 61 yards and Warren with 25.
 Senior lineman Carl Bork also added 11 tackles to lead the Cards defensively.
 When the dust cleared and the gun sounded, Wallowa had won the game 70-42.
