The Metropolitan Service District, who recently visited Morrow County, will be making a decision far in advance of that time frame. This petition, if passed would effectively kill the opportunity for this new industry in Morrow County.

Landfill economic significance great

To the Editor:

Morrow County voters will receive their ballots regarding landfill waste siting within Morrow County on October 19. It is very important that each voter understand the impact of his/her vote. The economic significance to Morrow County and the Port of Morrow is great.

The initiative petition, if passed, would require voter approval for location of any Morrow County landfill waste site proposed to accept refuse from outside Morrow County. If this petition passes, then the present Tidewater landfill proposal could not be voted on until the 1988 election. The current proposal would probably be withdrawn by that time. The economic benefits would thus be lost.

If the initiative petition is not passed, the current state and county procedures would be followed for siting of landfills. Failure to pass would make it possible to continue efforts to site the proposed landfill on schedule. In other words, if you are for the Tidewater landfill proposal, vote no on this initiative.

Following is a quote from the managers report, Port of Morrow, on the significance of the Tidewater landfill proposal: "You may wonder why the Morrow RE: Port had

Commends school lunch program

To the Editor:

While there are dates set aside each year to call attention to some event, activity or object, the week of October 11 is of particular local significance because it recognizes a local program, operated by local people, and for the benefit of local children.

For 41 years, Presidents have declared the second full week in October as National School Lunch Week. Yet, even though the program provides well-balanced meals to nearly 22 million children each day and is a large consumer of locally-purchased food and other supplies, National School Lunch Week is rarely acknowledged outside the school cafeteria.

I commend the state and local food service workers who make the program the local success it is. They are professionals dedicated to providing children with one-third of their daily nutritional requirement in an appealing and attractive manner as their limited resources allow.

Although a local program, school lunch is big business. Nationwide the school lunch program is the fifth-largest feeding operation, right up there with the largest fast food franchises. In Oregon, approximately 213,000 children eat school lunch everyday in 1,521 schools. Last year Oregon schools received \$32.8 million in federal food and funds.

Based upon many years of association with the National School Lunch program and visits to many local programs, I feel school food service workers are as dedicated to serving children as anyone in the educational system. If you think about it, outside of the principal, the school cook is probably the best known person in the school.

I take pride in my association with school food service workers. During National School Lunch Week I join with the children and parents of your community in thanking them for an excellent job.
