urge our friends and neighbors to vote NO! on the Solid Waste Landfill Initiative ballot.

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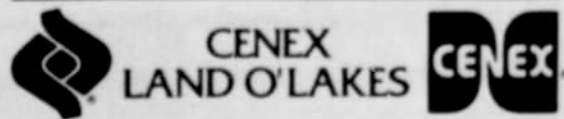
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
