

Cards unable to overcome Pirates

The lone Cardinal football team travelled to Cascade Locks for a rare Thursday game October 18.

The Cascade Lock Pirates came out throwing in the first quarter, sophomore quarterback Robb Freeman connected on a 57-yard pass to Junior back Andy Lee.

After failing the conversion attempt the Pirates led six to zero.

The Cardinals answered the Pirate scoring drive with a four-yard run from junior tailback Dustin Padberg.

The Cascade Lock team scored once more in the first quarter to make the score 14-6 at the end of the first quarter.

The Pirates struck for their third touchdown late in the second quarter with another catch by Lee thrown by Freeman.

The score at the half read 20-6 in favor of the Pirates.

The Cardinals seemed listless and lethargic in the first half. They didn't seem to have the intensity they had displayed in their first four games.

The second half proved to be different for the Cards who came out of the locker room very fired up and playing hard.

Ione scored first in the third quarter on a spectacular 35-yard touchdown reception by Kevin Ball. The pass was thrown by Padberg who threw the beautiful pass as a last minute desperation throw to avoid being sacked.

Freeman scored his first touchdown of the game on a 19-yard scamper late in the third quarter to

make the score 28-12 in favor of Cascade Locks.

Padberg scored his second touchdown of the game on a three-yard scramble at the start of the third quarter.

The Pirates answered the touchdown with one of their own on a 39-yard run.

The two minute warning had just sounded when the Cardinals recovered a fumble on their own 40 yard line.

The Cardinals marched down the field with key running by Padberg and Senior fullback Ken Snider.

It was Ball once again who scored the touchdown on a 4-yard blast with under a minute left to play.

In the end of the deficit was just too much to overcome and the Cards fell one touchdown short. The final score in the game was 34-26.

Ione plays Saturday, October 17 at Dufur.
