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Irrigon Public Safety Director sworn in

Irrigon's new Public Safety Director, Steve Mackey, wants to be personally available for the people.

Mackey, who was sworn in at the October 13 Irrigon City Council meeting, said "You have time to give personalized police service in a small town."

"A little girl lost her glasses the other day. I had time to go help her find them," he added.

Irrigon has accepted their new Public Safety Director with open arms. "There has been a steady stream of people coming into my office saying how glad they are to have us here," said Mackey.

"The city government here is a good government. They have given me their support," he said. "The Police Commissioner has been excellent."

The good part of his job is helping people, but there is a bad side. "I hate to see the needless accidents, the carelessness, the 'it can't happen to me' attitude," he said.

The six years he has served in law enforcement was spread between being a State Trooper for the Oregon State Police Department in Beaverton; a Deputy Sheriff for Clackamas County; and working in the Baker County Sheriff's Office.

Mackey took five years out of law enforcement to work for the public

Pheasant outlook good

Hunters coming from far and wide to hunt the ring-necked pheasant will find the population of the popular upland bird has increased in the Columbia Basin.

"Our brood count was up in this area," said Brad Bales, District Wildlife Technician for the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife in Hermiston. "Because of the dry spring, there was good hatching conditions."

There will be an extended hunt again in this area, beginning October 17 and ending December 13. "Because of the mild winters, there is a fairly stable pheasant count

here," said Bales. "It was decided the extended hunt wouldn't hurt the pheasant population."

"If the weather conditions become harsh, we can have an emergency closer," he added.

The daily bag limit is two cock pheasant per day and eight in possession.

Boeing, Boardman, and Port of Morrow have regulated hunting areas. The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) has made a cooperative agreement with private land owners to allow public access to their land, by permit only, with ODFW doing the patrolling.

Boardman has 12,000 acres, Port of Morrow has 2,500, and Boeing has 11,000 acres of regulated land for Saturday, Sunday, and Wednesday hunts. Permits can be obtained at check stations at each area.

Bales urges hunters to get permission from private land owners before they hunt those fence rows and corn fields. "Land owners don't have to post 'no trespassing' signs for them to legally be able to prosecute for criminal trespass violations," he said.
