Gardeners learn how to plant bulbs

"Plant Those Bulbs Right" was the subject of the program presented by Helen Martin from information gathered by Jean Brazell at the October 14 meeting of the Lone Garden Club.

Club members met at the home of Virginia Peck at 10 a.m. to put together the 1986-87 history scrapbook followed by a lunch.

Helen stated that one could have as much as 120 days of bloom with the many kinds of bulbs available. Spring bulbs should be planted at least by early autumn to allow good root growth. Rule of thumb indicates they should be planted at least two

times the depth of the bulb. It is suggested that bonemeal be used when planting because it is released slowly, she said. One should be sure

there are no air pockets around bulb. After blooming, the blossoms should be cut off and the leaves left to mature. Bulbs should be divided at least every 6-8 years. Tulips must not be in standing water and remember "mice love tulips," so it might be advisable to plant bulbs in a wire basket to prevent losing them to the mice. Bulbs may be stored in a cool, dark and dry place or they

may be left in the ground all winter.
