

# Heppner suffers first loss of season

A clipping penalty left the Heppner Mustangs four points short as the Umatilla Vikings handed the Mustangs their first Columbia Basin Conference loss 6-2.

The Mustangs had one of their best defensive efforts this year as the Mustangs gave up only one touchdown and stopped the Vikings twice inside the Heppner 10-yard line.

In the first quarter, defensive end Barney Lindsay tackled the Viking punter Martinez in the end zone to put the Mustangs up 2-0.

Heppner gave up two interceptions in the first half which stopped possible scoring drives.

In the fourth quarter, the Mustangs ran a reverse to Duane Ball who ran it 70 yards for a touchdown, being called back because of a clip. Plays later, punter Craig Angell tried a fake punt pass that was incomplete to Ball. The Vikings had the ball on the Mustang 13 yard line with Rod Tarter scoring on a three yard run with the run failing.

"Turnovers hurt us," coach Tim Birkby said. "The offense seemed to run in spurts, at times it worked real well and at times it couldn't do very much," Birkby added.

The next game is scheduled for

Friday, October 23, as the Mustangs travel to Wahtonka. The game starts at 7:30 p.m.

Weston-McEwen with the win took over sole possession of first place in the Eastern Division of the Columbia Basin Conference.

The Fillies playing in a totally dominated Tiger Scot gym with charged up football players cheering on their home team, were a bit hesitant in game one as they could never get the momentum going their way, losing the game 15-5.

Game two was a complete turn around as setter Shannon McLaughlin did a super job at the net. "McLaughlin turned in a fine all-around match of serving 16-16, worth 8 points, good setting, and completing some spike attempts. Shannon has played hard all season. Her experience showed as she put

out the effort we needed," stated head coach Terri Gentry.

Nance Wright, Jennifer Currin, Jeanie Fitzsimmons and Tami Lindsay all shined in the match with an excellent offensive output completing 24-25 attempts at the net for 96% accuracy, 44% of those being aces. "Tami turned in a 10-11 and 50% ace spiking performance over the last two matches and has improved her serve a great deal," says Gentry.

The Fillies cooled off a bit in game three as Weston-McEwen continued to serve well. The Tiger Scots then smashed two untouchable hits which seemed to dampen the Filly's spirits and gave Weston-McEwen the extra momentum needed to capture the third game and match 15-8.

"We had 4 serves called back during the match because of foot faults and that hurt," stated Gentry. Earlier in the season, the Fillies lost a heartbreaker to Athena 15-12, 7-15, 15-13.

Heppner plays tough Stanfield October 23 at home in their last match of the season, and will honor their three senior players. The coaches encourage those that haven't attended a game to come and give their support with their attendance at the last volleyball game of 1987.

## Cards burn Rangers for 46 points

The lone football team traveled to Dufur for a Saturday afternoon game October 17 with their tie for first place with Echo at stake.

The Cardinals were led by nearly flawless play by senior quarterback Kevin Ball and junior tailback Dustin Padberg.

The Cardinals ruined the Ranger homecoming ripping the Rangers 46-14.

Lone struck first scoring on a magnificent 60 yard breakaway run by Ball.

The point after attempt was scored by Snider on a pass from Ball.

After a fumble the Cardinals took over the ball on their own ten yard line.

Two plays later, Padberg ripped through the Dufur backfield to score on an 85 yard touchdown run.

Lineman Gary Rea, also got into the scoring column again for the second time this season scoring the two point conversion for the Cards.

The Cardinals opened up the second quarter with Ball running the ball in on a 35 yard scamper for a touchdown.

After yet another fumble the Cardinals scored another touchdown with the powerful running of Dustin Padberg who scored from 35 yards out to put the Cardinals ahead 28-0. Senior fullback Kenny Snider also added several outstanding blocks for both Padberg and Ball.

The Cardinals went into their halftime protecting their 28-0 lead.

Lone returned the opening kickoff of the half, 50 yards for the touchdown. Ball who miraculously managed to get open, scored his third touchdown of the night.

Dufur answered with their first scoring drive of the night on a Naime 6 yard run.

After a Cardinal punt late in the third quarter, the Rangers scored on a long Naime run (Total yards not known).

The Rangers scored one of the two conversion attempts to leave the score at the end of three quarters 34-14.

Ball scored again midway through the fourth on yet another run, this one for 10 yards.

After getting the ball again in the fourth quarter, junior Brian Ball scored on a 13 yard sprint to finish out the scoring for both teams.

The final score for the game was Cardinals 48 to Rangers 16.

Padberg ended up with 209 yards on 27 carries with two touchdowns. Ball who scored 4 touchdowns, also had a big day rushing with 13 carries for 195 yards.

"Kenny (Snider) really had some great blocks to help a lot," Padberg said later when asked about his great game.

The Cardinals travel next week to the home of the Culver Bulldogs.
