Fillies get one more chance for District Tournament spot

The Heppner varsity volleyball team went out and made it look fun and easy as they once again overtook the Pilot Rock Rockets, this time in two quick games 15-6, 15-13 on October 20. While the Fillies were making quick work of the winless Rockets in Columbia Basin play, Umatilla was in the making of ousting Stanfield from a second place district tournament berth. A win at Heppner October 27 against the visiting Stanfield Tigers, could now send the Fillies to District in the Number 2 spot.

At Pilot Rock, behind the superb serving from Nance Wright 8-9, worth 8 points, and added help from juniors Sandi Turner and Tami Lindsay, Heppner easily overpowered the Rockets taking game one 15-6.

Shannon McLaughlin continued strong serving as she started out on the right foot in game two producing 6-6, worth 5 points at the serving stripe. Michelle Wallis and Jennifer Lundin also chipped in 4-4 and

5-5 respectively. Wallis turned in a fine game with aggressive play at the net.

The Rockets, eyeing a shut out in the win column during league play, posed a comeback threat against Heppner late in game two.

Behind the sets of McLaughlin and junior Christy Stroerber, Sandi Turner rose to the occasion by turning in one of her best matches this season. Turner played an all around game of passing, setting and dishing dink sets and spike attempts accurately into the opponents court. Jennifer Currin successfully placed a number of untouchable hits, followed by Wright and Lindsay. Terri Gentry was quoted as saying,

"This time Heppner will be in a do or die situation on October 27 with the hopes of upending Stanfield. With a win, Heppner will be the Number 2 team behind Weston-McEwen at the District Tournament. A loss will end Heppner's season and send Stanfield on to district."

Episcopal church annual convention held October 16-18

Hood River-Delegates to the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Oregon's annual convention in Hood River Oct. 16-18 approved resolutions that included a five year vision statement for the diocese which stresses ecumenical relations and Christian mission, and adopted a uniform clergy compensation plan.

Another resolution, also approved, directs the national church's Standing Liturgical Commission to review all collects and prayers in the Book of Common Prayer which refer to the Holy Spirit as "He" and to substitute a more appropriate pronoun. The same resolution also asks the Liturgical Commission to "review closely the role of the Holy Spirit in the Incarnation of the Son as expressed in the most ancient texts of the Apostles' and Nicene/Chalcedonian Creeds and to make the most accurate translation possible."

The more than 200 Episcopalians who attended the convention

represented 23 Episcopal churches in the 58,000 square mile Diocese, which includes all of Oregon east of the Cascades.

Convention delegates also approved a special collection to be taken each year to be contributed toward a Diocesan Seminararian Fund, and resolved that all rectors and vicars should make at least 20% of their time available to the diocese.

Delegates elected Richard McBee of Hood River, the Rev. Lawrence Ferguson of Prineville to the diocesan standing committee, and named the Rev. Terry McCabe of Milton-Freewater, Karen Bounds of Hermiston and Robert Gibson of Sunriver to the Diocesan Council.

The Parish of St. Mark the Evangelist in Hood River hosted the convention, which had evangelism as its theme.

Delegates attending from All Saints' Church in Heppner were Gail Hughes, Pauline Winter, Marcia Anderson and Fr. Tony Bullman. Barbara Bullman also attended.
