MCGG makes profit for 1987

The Morrow County Grain Growers made a small profit fiscal year 1987, despite poor economic conditions, co-op Manager Larry Mills told the annual meeting Monday night.

M.C.G.G. made \$6,574 in 1987, on sales of \$23,947,976. This compares with a profit of just over \$48,000 on sales of \$23,553,780 in 1986.

The drop in profit was blamed on acreage going into the conservation reserve program (a federal program which reduces the amount of acres farmed in the county), a program which caused a decrease in demand for farm equipment sold and the amount of what handled by the co-op.

Mills said the co-op did well to remain profitable. "We felt we made some progress in moving the company in line with the economic conditions of today," he said.

He pointed to brighter spots on the farm horizon such as record wheat yields in the county, improvement in wheat prices, and gains in the cattle market. "These are all reasons for optimism," Mills said.

In other business at the annual

meeting, Charlie Anderson of Heppner was elected President of the co-op, Mark Miller vice president, and Ned Clark secretary.

Also Mike Bunch, Keven Haguewood and John Kilkenny were elected to the board of directors.

Outgoing president Lyle Peck and 1985-86 vice president John Ledbetter were presented with pen sets for their contributions to the co-op.

Meteor spotted by Forestry Lookout

Karen Holland was surprised Friday, October 23, when at 2:45 p.m. she noticed the sky lighting up from Madison Butte Lookout, where she is the forestry lookout throughout the summer. What she actually was seeing was a meteor from the meteor show Orionid, although she didn't know it at the time.

She received a call from Dick Pugh, Cleveland High School in Portland, who is a representative of the Smithsonian Institute, who wanted to interview Karen regarding her sighting. He was interested in what she saw what the meteor sounded like and did she get any pictures. Karen also received a call and was interviewed over the phone by Pine Mountain Observatory, Bend, on October 26, with questions regarding her sighting. They are trying to pinpoint the location of the meteor and have interviewed 85 people in regards to this sighting. They are very interested in locating a piece of the meteor as this is something not easily acquired.

On Wednesday, October 28, at 5:55 p.m., Karen also heard a very loud noise from her lookout on Madison Butte. She learned that this was from the firing of Inter-ballistic missiles from Vandenberg AFB located in California.

Life can be very interesting for a lookout in the Blue Mountains.

Insulate your meter for the winter months. You may use gunny sacks, insulation, rags, etc. in a plastic bag. PLEASE DO NOT USE SAWDUST OR BARK. If you have had frozen pipes in the past, it is advisable to let a faucet run at a fast drip during extremely cold weather. Any damages resulting from frozen water meters that have not been insulated will be repaired at the owner's expense. You will be billed a minimum until the meters are read again in mid-March.

Please avoid putting rubber and plastic items, oil, grease, etc. into our sewer system. These items clog the sewer lines causing sewage to back up, perhaps into your home.
