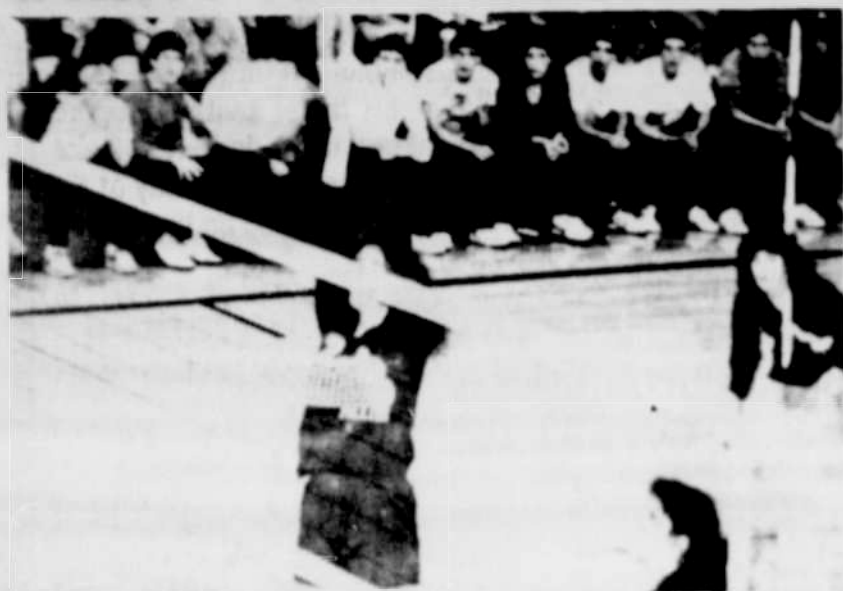


Fillies lose District Tourney berth



Tami Lindsay goes up for block against Stanfield

The Heppner Varsity Fillies in a hard fought and electrifying volleyball match on October 27 lost their district tournament berth to Stanfield on their home court, but gave the Tigers a fight they won't soon forget in a long tiring match 12-15, 15-13, 13-15.

Heppner, playing with great intensity in front of a supportive home town crowd started out strong in game one behind Shannon McLaughlin and junior Nance Wright going 5-5 and 5-6 at the service line. Heppner had the momentum flowing and stepped out to an early 11-5 lead. Just when things were clicking, a number of serving miscues, a couple net violations and an illegal set turned the tables on the Fillies with the Tigers quick to take control and comeback with a 15-12 win in game one. "We had game one and let it slip right out of our hands. Stanfield served as poorly as we did in the first game, but they capitalized on our mistakes," stated second year head coach Terri Gentry.

Knowing game two was do or die

for the Fillies, Heppner was not in the least dejected and came roaring back with a superb job at the service stripe. As a team, the Fillies went 26-27 for 96%, while Stanfield was 20-24, for 83%. McLaughlin led the way followed by sophomore Jennifer Currin and juniors Sandi Turner and Michelle Wallis. "Serving hasn't always been our strong point this season, but the girls did it in game two with the pressure never being greater," said Gentry.

Capitalizing from McLaughlin and junior Christy Strober's sets was Jennifer Currin at the net with 14-17 attempted attacks, 5 being kills. Currin was followed by junior Tami Lindsay 11-12, 4 kills and senior Jeanie Fitzsimmons and Nance Wright, both chipping in 2 kills.

Going into game three both teams were beginning to tire as the game was being fought tooth and nail in a see-saw fashion, with Heppner and Stanfield trying hard to gain the advantage. Once again Heppner did

well at the service stripe going 32-34 while Stanfield went 30-34. "Stanfield did better in the attacks at the net. We had lots of attacks but they weren't as powerful as they usually are and Stanfield always had a hand in returning them," said Gentry. It was nip and tuck all through game three but the Fillies fell short losing the game and match 13-15.

Senior Shannon McLaughlin playing her last match in a Filly uniform, saved her best performance for last with aggressive net play. "Shannon went 9-10 at the net, 8 kills along with a perfect serving night going 17-17, 8 points for the match. She really mixed things up for Stanfield with tips, spikes and dinks to the open holes. Teammates Jeanie Fitzsimmons and Sandi Turner, and Nance Wright, along with setter Christy Strober had the ball up there when she needed it."

Fitzsimmons, also a senior played her best match of the season with an all-around match of passing, hitting, and serving. Jennifer Currin, slowing her serve down a notch had an excellent night serving 18-20 for 13 points.

Coach Gentry was pleased with the teamwork and togetherness that the Fillies showed on the court. "They worked as a unit and that's what we've needed all season. It was quite obvious they all wanted to win, we just fell short. Our home crowd was a big bonus for us."

With the loss, Heppner ends the season going 4-4 in league play and 6-7 overall. "It's hard to compete with teams like Weston-McEwen and Stanfield playing 22 and 18 matches this season when we only had thirteen scheduled for us," Gentry said. The bright spot for Heppner is having six returning seniors with an experienced setter. They will be a contender in 1988.
