The Morrow County Historical Society has received a fine letter from Blanche Groshens Dempsey with data on the building of a fountain near the Fairgrounds. She tells us that it was built sometime after 1918 and before 1925 by Vic Groshens Sr. He was a contractor doing much work in Heppner around this period, and did much of the work on the Courthouse from

1902-03. He owned and ran the "Frog Pond" Saloon until it burned in 1918. He built many rock walls for people and did rock work under bridges after the early 1920's. Our thanks to Mrs. Dempsey and other people who have called and showed an interest in the fountain and its repairs. The Society hopes work will start in the spring. An article appeared earlier in the Gazette-Times on this fountain.
