Bids shall contain a statement by the Bidder that the provisions required by ORS 279.350 and U.S. Dept. of Labor (Workmen on Public Works to be Paid Not Less than the Prevailing Rate of Wage) are to be complied with. The bid shall also contain a statement by the Bidder that the Equal Employment Opportunity requirements are to be complied with.
Each proposal must be submitted on the prescribed bid blanks and shall be accompanied by bid security in the form of certified check, cashier's check, or surety bond payable to the Port of Morrow.
