Globetrotters to perform in Portland January 24

Now in their 62nd season, the Globetrotters are riding a 6,043 game winning streak. They're led by James "Twiggy" Sanders, the "Clown Prince of Basketball", Clyde "The Glide" Austin and Osborne "The Wizard" Lockhart.

The Globetrotters will take on the Washington Generals, led by Nancy Lieberman, considered by many to be the greatest woman basketball player of all time. A member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team, Lieberman became the first woman to compete in a men's professional league

(the United States Basketball League) in 1980. She played a season each for the Springfield Fame and the Long Island Knights, before joining the Washington Generals last November.

Tickets are priced at \$8 and \$11 for adults. Kids and senior citizen tickets are set at \$6 and \$9.

The world famous Harlem Globetrotters will make their only Oregon performance Sunday, January 24 at Memorial Coliseum in Portland. Game time is set for 1:30

p.m. with tickets on sale now at the Coliseum and at all G.I. Joe's Ticketmaster outlets around the state.

Wheat producers to receive advanced payments

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today that eligible 1987 crop wheat producers

may receive in advance 75 percent of their estimated emergency compensation payment, also known as "Findley" payments.

It is estimated that the total payment rate will be 25 cents per bushel with the advance portion to be 18 and 3/4 cents per bushel. The advance payments will be made in generic commodity certificates as soon as possible.
