Haskell M. Sharrad
A memorial service for Haskell M. Sharrad was held in the chapel of Burns Mortuary in Pendleton on Friday at 2 p.m.
Sharrad, 65, of Pendleton, died Monday, Jan. 11, 1988 at his home.
He was born Sept. 27, 1922, at Willows, Ore., Heppner Junction, son of Maurice and Rosetta Sharrad.
He attended schools in Arlington and was graduated from high school there.
During World War II he had the service stations at Arlington.
At one time he served on the Heppner City Council.
Sharrad had lived at Pendleton for the past 20 years. He owned the Surplus Outdoor Supply Store in Pendleton and was in business with A.E.F. Manufacturing Co. in Hermiston.
An active amateur ham operator, Sharrad taught some classes in the operation of ham radios.
He was a member of the Umatilla County Special Transportation Committee and the Amateur Ham Operators.
Survivors include his wife, Sarah at the home; sons Tod of LaGrande and Tim of Enterprise; brothers, Francis of Boise, Eugene of Portland, and Stanley of Salem; sisters Velma Wilken of Dryden, Wash., Blanche Simms of Arlington, Bebe Munkers of Heppner and Billie Walker of Los Olivos, Calif.; there are five grandchildren.

It's Almost Too Late



A school budget is an evolutionary thing, growing up over several months to eventually be come the multi-page document by which the district plans to spend millions of dollars in the coming year.
Budget preparation begins with carefully kept records of prior year's expenditures. From that, nearly every employee participates in making requests for the upcoming year. Classroom teachers, janitors and bus drivers pass budget requests up the chain of command to their department heads, foremen and supervisors, through the individual school principals to the district office. Every step along the way each request is questioned, examined and evaluated.
The district office, the superintendent and his assistant prepare a complete budget document.
And then the public scrutiny begins.
The budget committee, composed of the seven member school board and an equal number of committee members hold a series of "budget hearings" throughout the county. That's where the general public is welcome to make comment on the proposed budget either generally or on specific items. Based on that public comment and their own impressions, the budget committee makes revisions in the proposed budget before it is submitted to the voters. That's the way it's supposed to work.
I attended the budget hearing last week in Boardman and I felt awfully lonely. There was the budget committee. There was the superintendent and his staff. There was the collection of school principals. All the participants were there.
And there was me and only one of my neighbors. The "public" had no comment.
There will be plenty of my neighbors who will vote 'no' on the completed budget. Maybe even a majority. Then the budget committee will reconvene and wonder what else to cut and where and why. They'll do the best they can and try it again. And there will still be those who vote 'no'.
It would be so much easier if my neighbors and friends throughout the county would go to the budget committee and say their piece before the budget is completed, like it's supposed to work. The committee would then know how the voters feel and could better prepare a budget consistent with the desires of the public. Maybe even one that most of us could approve.
There is still time, the next budget hearing in on the 25th of January.
