We must watch our future concerning the buying and selling and watch the plans our own country may be making for the future of the farmers. An article was read from the National Grange, concerning a bill in the Massachusetts Legislature. This may well effect the cattle growers in the whole USA if it is allowed to pass. (Cease) Coalition to End Animal Suffering and Exploitation. This would provide the creation of an advisory board to oversee livestock production practices. This will, of course, mean higher cost to the consumer and much unnecessary work and expense to the grower. The National Grange is opposing this. Tom Campbell

reported that there is a shortage of soft white wheat, with the correct protein count. This amount of protein in the grains has a bearing on the price of the grain, and it is hoped that soft white wheat, high in protein will come up in price. The CRP Program was discussed and it was reported that Morrow County has 104,000 acres in the program. Kenneth Smouse reported that he recently attended a meeting and heard a most interesting report on No-Till practices and they find that in some cases application of fertilizers is affecting ground water, and a study is being made of this.

Barton Clark, reported in the US and Canada a free trade agreement was recently signed by the President. He also reported the State Ag committee is quite active and has a new member, Ray Hughes, from The Dalles. The next meeting will be in February in Roseburg and the next one in The Dalles.

Umatilla County Pomona will have a meeting at Tillicum Grange February 13 and will give the degree work starting at 2 p.m.

The new project concerning the community service awards was discussed. The recommendations have to be in the State office by April 15.
