

Boardman Police and Fire Dept. sees new appointees

The month of February saw two new appointments in the Boardman Department of Public Safety to com-

bine with the newly appointed Fire Chief last November to make three new title changes in Boardman's protective services in the last three months.

Acting Chief of Boardman's Public Safety Department, Steven B. Cearley, 36, was named Chief of Police as of February 1; officer Greg Sayles, 36, a patrol officer for the Public Safety Department, was given the title of Sergeant, effective February 12; and Milt Reynolds, 30, was designated Fire Chief for the Boardman City Fire Department in November.

Cearley, who has been acting Chief of the Public Safety Department since the retirement of Laddie Hancock last November, will receive a starting salary of \$22,000.

He has previous experience in both Morrow County and Umatilla County working as a criminal investigator in the public defenders office in Pendleton under Wallace Terry for one year.

Other experiences in Cearley's

record include serving as Corporal in the Stayton Police Department for five years; acting as Chief of Police in Mount Angel for two months, filling in until the permanent chief arrived; and a one year position as deputy sheriff in Marion County.

Cearley earned his associate degree in police science from Chemeketa Community College in Salem and also has earned his Board on Police Standards and Training intermediate certificate. He is working towards receiving his advanced certification.

Chief Cearley was also appointed Director of the Boardman City Fire Department.

Greg Sayles has been with the Boardman Department of Public Safety for over a year, coming previously from Stanfield, where he served as a patrol officer for three years, and before that he was Chief of Police in Carnation, Washington for a little over a year.

His associate degree in law enforcement is from Bellevue Community College in Bellevue.

Sayles received no salary increase for the Sergeant position.

Fire Chief Reynolds, an eight year resident of the area, was also appointed as Fire Chief for Boardman Rural Fire Protection District in November, a separate entity from the Boardman City Fire Department.

Reynolds receives \$200 a year for his services for the Rural Fire District with four fire trucks in his charge and \$100 a month to perform the functions of Fire Chief for the City Fire Department, which has two fire trucks. Both districts work from the same two fire stations. One located in conjunction with the Boardman Police Department and the other located on Wilson Road, across from Sam Boardman Elementary.

"I'll be working full time for the City Fire Department this summer planning and training," said Reynolds. This will benefit both the rural and the city fire departments.

Both police and fire services can be contacted in an emergency by dialing 911.

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Boardman grade schoolers compete in Academic Contest

Eager fifth and sixth grade students from Sam Boardman Elementary in Boardman competed for the first time in the Knowledge Master Open. The National and State academic competition has been open

to only high school students and junior highers in the past.

A sealed computer disk containing 100 questions was sent to Sam Boardman Elementary along with 250 other schools in 41 states. Theresa Proctor, Challenge co-ordinator for Sam Boardman Elementary, broke the seal, then inserted the disk into the computer, eyes glued to the screen, waiting for the first of the general knowledge multiple choice questions to show.

At the end of the ninety-minute allotted time period, after working together as a team, the students had chosen 79 accurate answers out of the 100, to receive an accumulative score of 567. They finished ninth in

the state.

Even though it was a fun way for the academically-minded student to compete, the students took the contest very seriously. "I went around asking questions of everyone about the general knowledge to help me prepare," said sixth grader, Kenny Mounts.

Children chosen for the contest because of their excellent academic records were sixth graders: Betsy Hernandez (typist), Jason Smythe, Kenny Mounts, Weston Judd, Cleatus Thomason, Richie Olea, Debonia Trudeau, and Toby Hall; fifth graders: Kristie Killingbeck, Lee Holmes, Nathan Alexander, Robert Allison, Trudy Jurney, Ethan Maffey, and Valerie Garver.

The questions were prepared by the Academy of Arts and Sciences, Academic Hallmarks, Colorado.
