Edith B. Odom, 86, died February 12, 1988, in Salem.

Mrs. Odom was born July 24, 1901 in Elbing, Germany which is now Elblag, Poland, to August and O'Tillie Wiese. She emigrated to America with her parents and older brothers at the age of two. She and her family settled near Lincoln, Nebraska. They later moved to Gaston, Oregon. The homestead is now part of Hagg Lake.

At the age of 9 she began work outside the home.

On June 7, 1914, she married Alfred T. Odom. They lived in various places in Oregon including Morgan, Oregon where they owned and operated a wheat ranch. They moved to Salem in the late 1930's. Mr. Odom died in 1943. Since 1985, Mrs. Odom has resided at Webster Care Center in Kaiser, Oregon.

She is survived by a son, Foster A. Odom, Arlington, a daughter, Juanita Zielinski, Gervais; six grandchildren, nineteen great-grandchildren and six great-great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held February 17, at Rigdon-Ransom Funeral home in Salem. Interment was at Rose City Cemetery in Portland.

The reason for anonymity is clear. Our society clings to the belief that informants are evil. We all tell our children, "now don't be a tattletale." We even incorporate it our law with a long list of testimonial privileges, husband and wife, doctor and patient, lawyer and client.

We have an even more strongly held concept, 'though, and that is that we are entitleed to know and face our accusers.

As I see it, when things become so bad that we overcome our aversion to being a tattletale, we should have the guts to sign our name.
