School board hears reports

The Morrow County School Board met February 16 at the District office in Lexington.

The following business was approved:

-approved the transfer of Barbara Davis from her two hour per day custodial position at Columbia Junior High to a full time assistant custodial position at Riverside High School, effective February 1, 1988.

-approved the resignation of Judy Lindsey from her half-time P.E. aide position at Columbia Junior High, effective February 26, 1988.

-approved an extended responsibility contract for coaching "C" team boys basketball at Riverside High School for Jay Harman.

-approved a maternity leave for Mary Holmes, lone High School language arts teacher, during the months of April and May of 1988.

-approved extended unpaid sick leave days for Barbara Hayes, Heppner High School media specialist.

The Superintendent reported on the following:

-heard a report from Jim Bier on the recent state visitation on compliance with state standards on bus maintenance. The results of the visitation were generally very positive. Bill Adams and Everett Moore were complimented for their work in this area.

-heard from Mr. McCaslin that new information on asbestos inspections and management plans indicate a much broader requirement and greater costs than originally thought. It appears that we must identify every place that any type of asbestos occurs in schools or in any facility used for school purposes or

owned by the school district.

No one has applied for the vacant Board position. It was approved to readvertise and interview candidates at the March board meeting.

Under new business:

-read and discussed the proposed Communicable/Infectious Disease policy. Agreed that this policy will require more than two meetings to reach a point of approval.

-examined samples of Plan A and Plan B of proposed calendars for the 1988-89 school year. Action will be taken at the March Board meeting.

-approved a field trip request for the Riverside High School band.

-approved the appointment of Jim Brewer to the Computer Education Advisory Committee, replacing Bill Kuhn.

-approved the retirement of Geneva Coker from her position as teacher at A.C. Houghton Elementary at the end of this school year.

-read a letter from Mr. McCaslin in regarding recommendations on the assistant superintendent's salary for 1988-89.

-heard a report on a "Privatization Conference" from Susan Tolar and Jim Bier.

The Board heard that Mr. McCaslin will be making a presentation on the budget at the Morrow County Chamber of Commerce meeting on February 23 at 12 noon. Jerry Healy will represent the Budget Committee.

The Board approved a salary increase for the assistant superintendent consistent with the agreement with the principals.

The meeting adjourned at 1 a.m.

Smith files for fourth term

Republican Congressman Bob Smith is now officially in the race for the Second Congressional District. "It is with great pleasure I formally announce my intention to seek reelection to a fourth term as the representative of Oregon's Second Congressional District."

Smith says his two terms on the House Agriculture Committee, his chairmanship of the Congressional Republican Task Force on Agriculture and the fact that he founded and chaired the Congressional Beef Caucus is proof of his ability to lead. "For me the rewards of this job come from being dedicated to a purpose and being committed to a district, its constituents and one's own ideals."

Smith points to his key role in solving what he calls, "the bureaucratic nightmare arising out of the flawed Immigration Reform bill," as further evidence that common sense solutions work.

He says he will continue to push toward making a balanced budget part of the Constitution. He will also promote additional agricultural overseas markets, which he says is a cornerstone to a stable farming community and a healthy U.S. economy.

Smith has established himself solidly as a reliable voice for Oregon's timber and agricultural concerns. In 1987 the Congressman was responsible for bringing members of the Forest, Family Farms and Energy subcommittee to Oregon for the first time in history, helping to foster an understanding of the problems facing the district.

"1988," says Smith, will be a watershed year in American politics.

One of history's most capable and beloved presidents will be replaced. During a transition like this, it seems to me that Second District Oregonians need to be absolutely certain the person they send to Washington is a proven leader."
