A graveside funeral service for Carl F. Spaulding was held Friday at the IOOF Cemetery in The Dalles. Spaulding, 71, of Pendleton, formerly of Heppner, died Tuesday, March 1, 1988 at St. Anthony Hospital in Pendleton.

He was born Jan. 19, 1917, at The Dalles, son of Carl and Lue Marshall Spaulding. He attended schools at The Dalles and was graduated from The Dalles High School. He attended college at Oregon State University and Whitman College.

Spaulding served with the Army during World War II.

In 1940, he married Bette Simpson at The Dalles.

Spaulding worked for Standard Oil Co. in Long Beach, Calif., for seven years. He started his accounting career at The Dalles, moving to Heppner in 1954, where he purchased an accounting business office from Walt Barger.

Spaulding was a major promoter and organizer for cable television in Heppner where he served as secretary and treasurer for 26 years. He also served as treasurer of the OCCA and PNCCA and was commander of the American Legion at The Dalles and a member of BPOE 358 in Heppner. He retired and moved to Pendleton in 1982.

Survivors include daughters Judith Laughlin of Heppner and Janice Harper of Helix, a brother, Marshall of Hood River; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Development requires Incentives

There's been much talk and many man-hours devoted to economic development around the county lately. A committee appointed by the County Court has been meeting since last summer to develop an economic development strategy to satisfy requirements of the Department of Economic Development.

A committee of the Boardman/North Morrow County Chamber of Commerce meets every week. The Port of Morrow spends considerable time and effort on the subject.

While the effort is great, the accomplishments are few.

Economic growth comes about when businessmen pursue the profit motive. It is not caused by the wishes of public or quasi-public groups. New jobs, new plants, new product lines are developed within the free enterprise system. And the reason for development is to make a profit.

We often hear the virtues of the county extolled. Clean air, open space, and an excellent transportation system. But nowhere do we hear the disadvantages faced. We have few if any raw products; we have no skilled resident labor force; we have no market for finished products and we have little risk capital for investment. These are the things industry needs to make a profit.

As I see it, until we face up to our disadvantages and make some effort to overcome them, our economic growth will continue to stagnate. Here are some things we should be doing.

1. We should marshal our investment capital resources, both private and public. Buildable land is a form of capital about which we should have clear and public policy. Financial incentives to development would make the profit potential more attractive.
2. We should emphasize our raw products. Timber and timber products, agricultural products which are processed, refined and further processed elsewhere should receive our focus.
3. We should break down the political barriers to industry and its labor force. Land use regulations, local tax rates, water, sewer, and utility availability and cost and political opposition all dissuade economic growth. We must make the profit motive more persuasive to achieve economic development.
