Ione students have whale of time

Students at Ione Elementary School have been having a whale of a good time the past few weeks. It all started when Will Peters from the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry spoke to each class on whales. He brought whale bones for students to examine and a large inflatable whale for students to walk around in.

As a spin-off from this one day activity, students have continued their study in each classroom. They all viewed the National Geographic Society filmstrip on whales. Primary students also studied The Wonders of Learning Kit on Whales.

Mrs. Davison's kindergarten accumulated a fun library on whales, identified different types of whales and will make a whale wind sock.

Mrs. Rietmann's first grade students each drew and cut out their favorite whale on a large sheet of paper. They stuffed their whales and have them on display in the hallway for others to enjoy. They painted pictures of whales and wrote reports on whales as mammals.

Mrs. Morris' second grade created a 7 1/2 foot killer whale paper sculpture which now "swims" in their room. They made a wall chart of whale "facts" and did creative story writing about whales.

Mrs. Collin's third grade students each chose their favorite whale to write about. They also illustrated their reports and enjoyed doing a whale puzzle.

Mrs. Kincaid's fourth grade class made a whale exhibit in the hallway to share with other classes. They used the library and their library skills to do scientific research on whales. Each student did an original illustration of a whale and they learned to spell vocabulary words related to the study of whales.

Mrs. Davison taught an enrichment class for students in Kindergarten through second grade. Students built an electric game board. The game entails matching questions and answers that encompass some of the research information they discovered about whales.

Mrs. Kincaid taught an enrichment

class for students grades three through six. Students investigated the truly American folk art of scrimshaw as practiced by the sailors on whaling ships. They saw a movie on the art of scrimshaw showing how whale bones and teeth were carved with intricate designs. The group experienced and created the art by carving on plastic and darkening the design with lampblack and oil imitating, as best they could, the old techniques.

Mrs. Matthews, music teacher, added to student enjoyment by playing recordings of "To the Last Whale" by Crosby and Nash, "Farewell to Tarwaite" recorded by Judy Collins acappella with whale songs, and other selections. Students learned to sing "Ode to Big Blue" and "Baby Beluga."

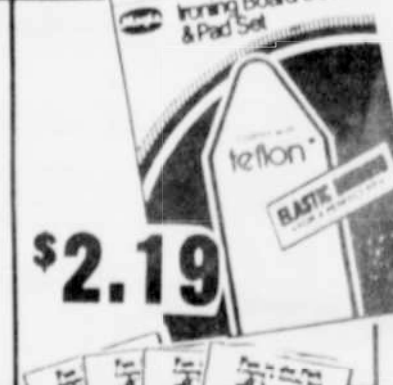
