Road Report

CONSTRUCTION CREW

The Wilson Road Project reconstruction continues to go well. The gravel base under the old road is better than hoped, so most, if not all, of the old road surface will be reprocessed into the old base to further stabilize it, and the new road alignment will be made with a 1-2 inch layer of crushed rock from the County's stockpile on the Boeing property.

The road widening (from about 18-20 foot to 28 foot) has been accomplished for approximately 2 of the 3 mile long project. Several new drainage culverts have been installed and additional land draining work performed.

Dust control is a number 1 priority. Straw will be disked into the sandy roadsides along the first 1/2 mile in addition to steady watering and eventual grass seeding.

MAINTENANCE CREW

Those Road Department personnel available from the Wilson road project will be working on restoration work at the Big Butter Creek and the Clark's Canyon county rock pits.

PATCH CREW

The North End crew will be concentrating on patching in some areas of critical need. In the South End gravel road maintenance will proceed as highest priority until warmer weather arrives.

BLADE CREW

The recent rains have been timely for our gravel road maintenance. The middle and north county roads were just about dried out. However, those rains did bring some weather damage, but very slight in comparison to previous years. The county graders are blading the gravel roads in the South Ione and South Lexington areas, working south and east toward the mountains.

CRUSHER OPERATION

The county's rock crusher has been relocated to North Ione vicinity to begin work on crushing 20,000 c.y. for roads in an approximate 10 mile radius of that location of North Ella road.

WILLOW CREEK ROAD PROJECT

Site investigation continues on a county pit for the Willow Creek Federal Forest Program road project, which will complete the Willow Creek road reconstruction all the way to the mountains. The first of the two construction projects in this agreement will begin this summer.

Scotch Thistle has been upgraded to an "A" list noxious weed in Morrow County.

Formerly on the "B" weed

list, the change means that landowners are now responsible for eradication of Scotch Thistle on their

Infestations of Scotch Thistle in Morrow County are small enough, Weed Supervisor Jim VanWinkle said that eradication or containment is still possible.

Small plants can be chopped off with a shovel. For larger infestations he advised waiting until fall or spring to begin an herbicide program.

The weed causes problems primarily on rangeland and in wasteland. Fields recently seeded to grass under the Conservation Reserve Program should be watched for Scotch Thistle, he said, because the weed may have been in the ground but kept under control with regular farming practices.

Scotch Thistle, a biennial, may be identified the first year by the large amount of soft white hair on the up-

per leaf surface of the rosette. The second year, plants may grow 4-8 feet tall with one purple flower blooming at the end of each stalk in June. The stem is characterized by winged tissue.

Landowners who refuse to control "A" list weeds may be cited. If a landowner still refuses to begin herbicide controls, the weed supervisor has the authority to spray noxious weeds, or to have it done at the landowner's expense.

Eradication letters and control measures are being sent to landowners who have Scotch Thistle growing on their property. A spot check will be conducted to see if growers are complying with the law.
