## Information regarding 4-H Summer Week

Project Discovery will allow an in-depth look at a 4-H area of interest, including career possibilities, subject matter and decision making.

Afternoons will find the young people involved in a variety of leisure education activities. Toward the 90's is the theme of the 74th annual 4-H event on the OSU campus in Corvallis.

County 4-H members who do not receive information about Summer Week are asked to contact their County Extension office for the information, Broderick said.

## Tourism committee supports plan F

The Heppner Tourism Committee met on March 8.

It was suggested that the committee support Alternative F, in the Proposed Land and Resource Management Plan, with the caveat that certain recreation areas be preserved for recreation purposes, such as the trail from Cutsforth Park to the top of Bald Mountain. A letter to that effect will be drafted for approval of the committee.

The committee approved a placemat design featuring a county map with five pictures with text - one for each community in the county. The idea will be presented to ICABO to enlist their support.

They discussed the NCOTC tourism brochure and chose the pictures to be featured. The East Oregonian is again producing a Tourism Guide and each community will have an opportunity to provide input for the guide.

The St. Patrick's Day Week-end preparations were discussed and an interview with Debbie Kennedy, State Director of the Tourism Division was heard from chairman, Fred Lundin.

The next meeting is scheduled for 8 a.m. on April 5.

## Ex-Heppnerite enjoys St. Patrick's Day Weekend

I've just experienced a joy-packed St. Patrick's weekend in the dear land of Shamrocks and Shepherds (Morrow County, Oregon) and its Irish capital Heppner. The many dedicated volunteers, the Chamber of Commerce, the merchants, the clubs and churches all worked so well together as a 6th Annual Committee in carrying out more than 30 special events during the weekend.

Old timers told me that the Irish tri-colored flag was hoisted there every March 17 during early-day celebrations, but now during the modern revivals, the Jimmy Farley inspired festivities, we noted the stars and stripes all along Main Street. Everyone should appreciate the meaning behind the flag of the Republic of Ireland. It's inside green stripe represents the great Catholic population throughout the Emerald Isle; it's outside orange stripe stands for the Protestant population centered in northernly Ulster, and the white stripe between the green and the orange represents the long awaited unity which is so bloody and violent during transition.

It seems to me that Heppner sets a magnificent example of that dreamed of unity. What splendid cooperation exists between the members of it's St. Patrick's Roman Catholic congregation and the members of the various Protestant churches of the community.

Although Heppner, affectionately known as the Irish Capital of Oregon, is the center of the weekend of celebrating the death date of Ireland's most renowned saint, all of Morrow County and much of northeastern Oregon participates. The Governor, the uniformed cavalry and Morrow's Senator Don Cole, of the mythical State of Eastern Oregon, with Baker as its capital, were nicely recognized along with various other officials and aspirants to official positions.

It was impossible for me to attend each of the weekend's carefully managed events; therefore, I am only able to give first-person reports on about one-third of them. Chronologically, Friday morning I enjoyed my drive from my Yakima home accompanied by one of Ida Farra's sisters who lives in South Yakima Valley. Our first stop near Morrow's northeastern border was at the fascinating Cactus Greenhouse in Irrigon where I bought six small cacti.

We reached Ida's corner in time for some of her tasty soup plus other goodies, and then began much enjoyable visiting. I purchased my Lucky button in the early afternoon and enjoyed more visiting before the Irish stew dinner that evening at the Methodist Church. Although I used to relish roller skating I forgo it now.

Saturday Irene Swanson whisked me out to the county fairgrounds where we enjoyed a look at the sheep dogs and partook of a fine breakfast with our Senior Citizen friends.

We then went to the morning program with it's leaders KUMA's Ted Smith; the Morrow County born and reared Mayor of Pendleton, Joe McLaughlin, and visiting Washington D.C. attorney, Heppner native Dominic Monahan. Proper homage was paid to the weekend's queen, Kathleen Monahan Hisler and to the reigning king, his majesty Jimmy Farley, a cousin of Queen Kathleen. How quickly we learn that the dear pioneer families of this little New Ireland are all related.

This year's radio-promoted program brought music with the BMCC instrumentalists and singers, Irish soloists Billy Kenny and John Doherty, and the community choir led by Kathy Hoskins. The 1988 County Fair queen and court and their chaperone was presented. Bill Kuhn read a good update on the history and future of Heppner's St. Patrick Hotel. We listened to a humorous recorded telephone conversation from an Irish tavern and chuckled at a series of Irish jokes. As the program closed we again heard a recording of Bill Kilkenny reading a poem about loving Ireland and the U.S.A.

Soon it was time to gather in the lovely sunshine to await the exciting bed race and the Irish Parade. Bob Kahl and all of the parade committee really assembled a great show. During the afternoon we briefly attended the first Irish Auction and then went on to visit the Morrow County Museum and the exhibits by the Arts and Crafts.

Before dinner time we chatted with Dorothy and Charlie Heard from Milton-Freewater.

Besides the fine food at St. Pat's there was great entertainment featuring the faithful talented Larry Lindsay family and Billy Kenny who finally sang "My Wild Irish Rose" along with other great favorites.

On Sunday morning I managed a visit with Eleanor and Ed Gonty and Keith Lewis in the Gonty home, then went to church at the United Methodist Church. Before 1:30 p.m. after a quick lunch at Ida's her sister and I were driving back home to Yakima. The view window in my tenth-floor apartment in Sun Tower faces south, and I daily look through Union Gap toward Heppner from which I hope friends will be driving northward and stop to visit me.

So, I will see you again at next year's 7th St. Patrick's Celebration on March 17, 18 and 19 in 1989. Keep praying for the much needed rains, except on that special March weekend.
