New postal rates effective April 3

The cost of mailing a First-Class letter will rise to 25 cents beginning Sunday, April 3, but the Postal Service urges customers not to wait until the last minute to make their new stamp purchases. Your local post office has an ample supply of the new "E" stamps which went on sale nationwide March 23. The stamp has a postage value of 25 cents, the new First-Class rate and will remain on sale until post offices receive new denominated postage that conforms with the new rate. The new First-Class rate and in-

creases for other classes of mail were approved March 22 by the Governors of the U.S. Postal Service. It is the first rate adjustment in more than three years. The increase for First-Class Mail represents a 13.6 percent rise while the cost of second-class mail (magazines, newspapers) will rise 18.1 percent, bulk regular third-class will go up 24.9 percent and parcel post will increase 14.8 percent. Not all the rates went up. According to postal officials, the minimum cost for sending an Express Mail item (8 oz. or less) will be \$8.75.

D.A.'s Report

The District Attorney's office at the Courthouse in Heppner reports handling the following cases during the past week:

Frank Russell, 57, Redmond, appeared for trial on the charges of Transporting Livestock out of State without a Brand Inspection certificate before Judge Ralph Currin on March 25. Court dismissed on the grounds that the infraction had reached the Statute of Limitations of six months.

Juanita Dooney, 30, Irrigon, appeared for arraignment on March 25, 1988 on the charge of Criminal Trespass in the First Degree, before Judge Ralph Currin. Entry of plea is set for April 1.

Darrin Sim, 21, Boardman, appeared for Entry of Plea and plead not guilty to two counts of Theft in the First Degree, and one count of Burglary in the Second Degree before Judge Ralph Currin on March 25. No trial date has been set.

Anthony Steven Hecker, 36, Boardman, appeared for Change of Plea and plead guilty to No Motorcycle Endorsement, and Driving Uninsured, before Judge Ralph Currin, on March 25. On the charge of Driving Uninsured, defendant was fined \$250 which was suspended on the condition that the Defendant have no further offenses within one year. On the charge of No Motorcycle Endorsement, the Defendant was fined \$25 and pay \$6 for the benefit of the Board of Police Standards and Training account.

Gerald Paul Coons, 36, appeared for Entry of Plea on March 25 before Judge Ralph Currin and plead not guilty to Theft in the First Degree, and Burglary in the First Degree. No trial date has been set.

Terrell Rea, 22, Boardman, appeared for sentencing on March 25 before Judge Ralph Currin on the charge of Theft in the First Degree. Imposition of Sentence is suspended on the condition that defendant serve five (5) years formal probation to the Oregon State Department of Corrections, pay a Victims Assistance fee of \$50, make restitution to Stormont-Ray & Associates, Hermiston, in the amount of \$6,630.17, reimburse the State of Oregon for court-appointed attorney's fees in the amount of \$500.

Oregon FH 110, Monument-Sunflower Flats Road

The Western Direct Federal Division of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) in cooperation with Morrow County and the Forest Service plans to improve a 3.9 mile portion of the Monument-Sunflower Flats Road near Parkers Mill in Morrow County. This segment of road, which is also designated Forest Highway (FH) 110 and County Road 670, begins at junction with State Route 207 south of Heppner and extends southeast to an intersection with Forest Development Road 2119. The existing road varies in width from 24 to 28 feet and has a deteriorated gravel surface which is slippery when wet, very dusty when dry, and difficult to maintain. The irregular, sharp curves and poor drainage also contribute to operational problems on this road.

The proposed project consists of reconstructing the road to a uniform two-lane standard along its existing alignment with some curve corrections to provide adequate sight distance. This proposal, which includes base, drainage, and bituminous pavement, also realigns the intersection with SR 207 to correct sight distance deficiencies. Additional private right-of-way may be required in order to accommodate the curve corrections and the intersection realignment. Construction is scheduled for 1991.

Early coordination with Morrow County and the Forest Service indicates that the proposed project would not significantly affect the human environment.

Please inform this office of any special concerns or interests for the proposed improvements. Your input is also requested to help us determine what environmental investigations and clearances, including permits, are required for this project.
