DU has wetland conservation projects in Canada, Mexico and the United States. These projects make certain there is water available for waterfowl when they need it most.

Rachel F. Dick, 71, of Heppner, died Friday, April 8, 1988 at Pioneer Memorial Hospital in Heppner.

Memorial services were held at 11 a.m. Wednesday at the Heppner United Methodist Church.

Mrs. Dick was born Aug. 7, 1916 at Pueblo, Colo., daughter of Ben and Edna Church Forsythe. She attended elementary and high school at Ashland, Ore.

She graduated from Southern Oregon Normal School in 1935 and Southern Oregon College in 1963. She received her master's degree in education in 1969 from Oregon State University. She also did graduate and post graduate studies at Eastern Oregon State College, at the University of Texas and Savannah State College in Georgia.

She began her teaching career in 1935 at age 19 at Camas Valley, Ore., and completed her career as a first grade teacher in Heppner in 1978.

On Dec. 22, 1940, she married Ed Dick at Ashland.

She taught one year at Ione and was acting principal there in 1942. She started the first flower shop in Heppner and also drove truck for her husband's oil distributing company.

She was an avid photographer, painter and journalist and loved the outdoors.

She was a member of the Oregon Historical Society, the Heppner Methodist Church and a past member of Delta Kappa Gamma, PEO and Christmas Seal organization.

Survivors include her husband, at the home; sons, Ladd of Whidbey Island, Wash., Stuart of Lexington, Kevin of Gresham, Kyle of Salem; daughter, Erin of Portland; mother, Edna Forsythe of Lincoln City; brother, Jack of Otis, Ore.; nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

OSU schedules Livestock Day program

Topics related to the production of beef, sheep and swine will be featured during the Livestock Day program Saturday, April 23, at Oregon State University, according to Bill Zollinger, Extension beef cattle specialist.

The day, sponsored by the OSU department of animal science, opens with registration at 9 a.m. before the first general session at 10 a.m. in Withycombe Auditorium on the Corvallis campus.

While producers are learning about new research and production techniques, young people will have their own program, including a lamb sale, conducted by members of the

OSU livestock judging team under the direction of Tom Hill, team coach and animal science research assistant.

Livestock Day, combining species and the youth program, was designed to help producers and others consolidate travel costs to the annual educational event, Zollinger explained.

Additional information about Livestock Day may be obtained from Zollinger, while persons wanting more information about the youth program or wishing to enter a lamb in the sale should contact Hill. Hill and Zollinger are both in the animal science department.
