MEASURE NO. 1

AUTHORIZES WATER DEVELOPMENT FUND LOANS FOR FISH PROTECTION, WATERSHED RESTORATION

QUESTION: Shall fish protection and watershed restoration be added as projects that constitutionally may be financed by Water Development Fund loans?

EXPLANATION: Referred by legislature. Amends Oregon Constitution Article XI. Allows Water Development Fund, previously created by state borrowing, to finance loans to state residents for fish protection and watershed restoration projects. Does not change present authority to finance water development projects for irrigation, drainage, municipal uses and for acquiring related easements and rights of way, or requirement of secured repayment of loans. Continues to reserve at least 50 percent of Fund for irrigation and drainage loans.

MEASURE NO. 2

PROTECTIVE HEADGEAR FOR MOTORCYCLE OPERATORS AND PASSENGERS AND MOPED RIDERS

QUESTION: Shall law require motorcycle operators and passengers and moped riders to wear protective headgear?

EXPLANATION: Measure referred by legislature. Motorcycle operator and passenger and moped rider commit offenses if they ride without wearing protective headgear. Motorcycle operator commits offense if passenger not wearing protective headgear. Measure classifies offenses as Class C traffic infractions, except motorcycle passenger's failure to wear protective headgear, which is not classified by measure. Exempts persons in inclosed cab or operating or riding three-wheeled vehicle at less than 15 miles per hour. Forbids passengers on mopeds.

MEASURE NO. 25-1

ONE YEAR OPERATING LEVY OUTSIDE THE TAX BASE

QUESTION: Shall Morrow County Levy \$3,241,804 outside the tax base for operating purposes for fiscal year 1988-89?

EXPLANATION: The purpose of this levy is to provide funds to balance the Morrow County operating budget for fiscal year 1988-89 which includes: Road Fund; County School Fund; Cities portion of Road Funds; Fair & Rodeo Fund; and General Fund (which provides funding for Extension Service, Weed Control District, Soil & Water Conservation District, Senior Services Coordinator, Neighborhood Council, Predatory Animal Damage Control, Museum, Justice Court, Juvenile Director, Soil Erosion Control, and Watermaster, as well as those services required by Oregon Law).

QUESTION: Shall Morrow County Levy \$400,112 outside the tax base for Health Care operations for fiscal year 1988-89?

EXPLANATION: The purpose of this levy is to provide funds to balance the Morrow County Medical Fund operating budget for fiscal year 1988-89. These funds are to provide health care services and emergency medical services for all communities of Morrow County.
