Port of Morrow traffic doubles

Moving to Hawaii? The Port of Morrow will gladly "move" you.

One of the reasons the Port has doubled its revenue during the last 1987-88 fiscal year over the previous year, is because they cater to anything which will fit into a 40 foot container and doesn't weigh over 30 tons. Even to shipping personal automobiles, boats and household furniture.

The versatility of the Port ranges from providing shipping down the Columbia in ocean containers provided by K-Line, Matson, American President Lines, and Mitsui Steamship Lines; to providing facilities for plugging in refrigerator units; to binding a load of logs and sending the floating down stream. The Port also is capable of "roll on, roll off" loading and gantry-crane loading.

Providing access to world-wide shipping requires constant updating of knowledge and information to keep up with the ever changing global scene. "Our services are very sensitive to political situations and world wide changes in trade," said Bob Miller, Port Manager.

Ninety percent of the cargo going down the Columbia goes to Japan, according to Miller. The other ten percent goes to such far away places as Europe, India, Korea, China, Taiwan and Hawaii.

The ocean-going containers are loaded on barges, then loaded onto steamships at the Portland docks or loaded on "sprint" trains and taken to ports in Seattle or Tacoma on the Puget Sound.

The supply of ocean-going containers has not kept up with the demand. Due to the increase of exports from the United States and decrease of imports, there is stiff competition for the availability of the steel boxes. "The higher value cargos, the ones which pay the most for these boxes such as microchips, car parts,

and motorcycles, are going to get first call on the number of boxes," said Miller. "Our agricultural economy is a lower value cargo."

Undaunted by such challenges, the Port is working with the rest of Eastern Oregon on a Value-Add Program. "We have an abundance of raw products and intelligent people in the area," said Miller, "we need to put the two together to get more value from a product and to produce more labor."

The cake mixes produced by Pendleton Flour Mills, then shipped to Hawaii and Japan are a good example of adding value to the raw product, wheat.

Commodities of dried peas, beans, lentils, hay cubes, hay pellets, potatoe flakes, flour, wheat, wood chips, and cake mixes flow smoothly through dock-3 from Western Alfalfa, Pendleton Grain Growers,

Pendleton Flour Mill, Longview Fibre, Kinzua Lumber Company and one of the major world wide grain handling companies, Cargill Inc.

Developing the Boise, Idaho, area for the shipping business is on the Port's current agenda. "We feel Southern Idaho is part of our geographic location," said Miller. "It is straight down Interstate 84."

The entire picture of the Columbia River Barge container traffic has increased 16 percent in 1987 over 1986 and up 19 percent for the first quarter of 1988 over the similar period in 1987. "We have contributed substantially to that increase in river traffic," said Miller.

The safety record of moving cargo by river speaks for itself. "Old River People, ones with 40 years experience, can count the occasional accident on one hand," said Miller. "The river is a much safer mode of transportation than either rail or truck."

Pressure canner gauge testing now available

To have your gauge tested bring lid of your canner with gauge attached. You do not need the entire canner.

While you are there, you may want to pick up copies of the new food preservation bulletins. There are new recommendations this year for fruits and berries as well as vegetables.

"We tell you to have your pressure canner gauges tested yearly-and now it will be convenient to do so," says Birdine Tullis of Morrow County Extension Service.

A pressure gauge testing unit is now in place at the Heppner office of OSU Extension. The service has not been available any where within a reasonable distance and correct gauges are vital to food safety.
