Reagan honors Pest Control industry

President Ronald Reagan recognized the list of achievements by the urban environmental pest control industry, and thanked them on behalf of all Americans during National Pest Control Month in June.

"They do a great deal for all of us as they help preserve our food supply; prevent disease; protect homes, places of work, recreational areas, and so on," he said in a special Presidential message to the industry delivered to the National Pest Control Association in Dunn Loring, Virginia.

The President, in addition to mentioning that the start of summer and the height of the pest season, which coincides with June, the national observance month, is a fitting time to thank the professional pest control operators for their invaluable work, noted the industry's concern for the environment by using pesticides properly, and their continuous education program to teach

the public about the safe use of household chemicals.

"That is quite a list of achievements," he wrote, "and one for which we all can be grateful during National Pest Control Month and throughout the year."

Pest control firms annually service more than 10 million homes, as well as most of the nation's 240,000 retail food establishments, 400,000 commercial restaurants and kitchens and 55,000 hotels and motels.

Pest control companies are involved in the prevention and control of destructive and disease-transmitting insects, rodents and other pests.

The National Pest Control Association is a world-wide organization representing specialists in the field of urban environmental structural pest control. Formed in 1933, NPCA is a non-profit trade association in support of the industry and the public interest.
