Bright, athletic and popular are the words which describe a recent local appointee to the United States Air Force Academy.

Terrie Meyer, an eighteen year old Riverside High graduate, has received a \$192,000, four year appointment to the thirty-three year old academy near Colorado Springs in Colorado.

She also received an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point in New York, but chose the Air Force. The opportunities at Colorado Springs are more to Terrie's liking.

"More women astronauts come out of the Air Force," said Terrie. "I may want to do that some day."

Jet pilot training is her goal for the present. Women, at this point in time, do not fly jets, but Terrie hopes to train people to be pilots.

Terrie, who made the state of Oregon's All Star Volleyball, second team, will also be playing varsity intercollegiate volleyball at the academy.

The 5'9" brunette was recruited by the air force coach via video tapes.

Terrie leaves June 29 for 5 weeks of basic training with flight training mixed into her schedule.

August 10 she will go straight into the school year.

To enter the academy, located in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains, Terrie agreed to serve four years as a cadet and five years as an air force officer.

The United States government provides food, housing, and medical care for the cadets. Terrie will also receive \$500 a month to pay for her uniforms, textbooks and personal expenses.

She enjoys participating in the youth group at Our Lady of Angels Catholic Church in Hermiston. She plays tennis and plays the piano. Reading is also high on her list of pleasurable things to do.

Terrie has won the Morrow County Spelling Championship in her division each year for the last seven years; attended the honors program at Western Oregon State last summer; attended Oregon's Business Week at Western Oregon State, and was invited to West Point's Academic Work Shop in New York last summer.

When asked what her aim is for her duration at the air force academy, Terrie replied, "I hope to come out a better, more rounded person."

Shorts now okay for Morrow County School dress code

Shorts may now be worn by students to school in Morrow County.

The Morrow County School Board revised the dress code recently to include shorts as proper attire for the students during the months of September May and June.

Prompted by a request from the Sam Boardman Elementary student council regarding the acceptable length of pants or shorts, the school board approved the change in the student dress code for a one year probationary period.

Said Holly Miller, 17, a Riverside High senior, "I like the rule and the freedom it gives the students. I like

the responsibility which has been given to us, but," she added, "I'm afraid it will be abused and there will just be a hassle."

Clothing which are not acceptable at any time of the year are transparent or see-through clothing, slit skirts with slits above the mid-thigh, sundresses or sleeveless shirts that do not cover the width of the top of the shoulder, clothing of an immodest nature, tank tops, cut-outs, cut-offs, half-shirts, jerseys or sweat shirts in bad taste and any form of clothing which is torn, frayed, dirty, or contains slogans which are profane or suggest the advertising of any form of drug.

Summer story hours underway

Hunt deadline is July 1

Hunters are reminded that Friday, July 1, is the deadline for applying for a license for the controlled deer and elk hunt.

In order for you to apply you must meet the following requirements. You must have an adult hunting license and you may apply at 11 year old provided you are 12 or older at the time of the hunt for which you are applying.

Each individual must purchase, fill out and mail a separate application card for each species applied for.

You must go to a license agent and request a 1988 Controlled Hunt Application form. Have the agent check the one box which indicates the type of hunt you intend to apply for (Controlled Buck Deer, Antlerless Deer or Controlled Elk).

The cost of the application form includes the price of the tag plus \$3 nonrefundable application fee and a 50 cent processing fee.

The agent will have you sign the form you are purchasing. Make sure the correct box has been checked on the form.
